MY TRIP TO GUERREO

On my recent trip to the Rotary Eye Clinic in Guerrero, Mexico, which, by the way, was a very rewarding experience, the Rotary Club of Guerrero brought to us a need to help an orphanage in La Punta, Mexico. There are 71 children in a small house. The only food is what they can get when the grocery throws out old food. They eat in shifts because of the small kitchen and limited seating. They had no heat and the temperature drops to the 30's at night. They each had one change of clothes (a tee shirt and shorts) but no shoes. Their hot water heater and clothes dryer had quit working plus the small washing machine could not keep up. For sleeping they have four bunk beds. They put two together so ten kids can sleep crossways on the top and ten on the bottom. The rest of the children sleep on the floor. They receive funds from no one, not even the government. Their current landlord wants to raise their rent in spite of the fact they can not even pay the current rate. A La Punta businessman has donated a piece of land to them and the college in Chuachua is drawing up



plans for a building. Here is what we did: At one of our evening dinners, we asked for commitments to help with the immediate needs and to start the new building. We hoped for maybe \$2,000 but you know how Rotarians are, in fifteen minutes we raised \$21,000 from those assembled. With some of this money they will be able to purchase warm clothes and food. Also, while there we were able to purchase and have delivered a hot water heater. The bottom line is, I committed to get an industrial size washer and dryer and \$2000 cash. I approached our board of directors and they approved this and will consider making it an on-going project. I have purchased the washer and dryer and they have already been delivered. Other Rotary clubs are getting the kids shoes and a toy each for Christmas. The same foundation that manages the eye clinic, The Christal Foundation, will oversee this project as well. I hope you will join me in giving your support to this new project. I also encourage you to take the time to go and see first hand. I was so touched as were many others were, I will be going back. Thanks for supporting Rotary, Earl Maudlin

THE OLD MAN

As I came out of the supermarket that sunny day, pushing my cart of groceries towards my car, I saw an old man with the hood of his car up and a lady sitting inside the car, with the door open. The old man was looking at the engine. I put my groceries away in my car and continued to watch the old gentleman from about twenty five feet away. I saw a young man in his early twenties with a grocery bag in his arm, walking towards the old man. The old gentleman saw him coming too and took a few steps towards him. I saw the old gentleman point to his open hood and say something. The young man put his grocery bag into what looked like a brand new Cadillac Escalade and then turn back to the old man and I heard him yell at the k old gentleman saying, 'You shouldn't even be allowed to drive a car at your age.' And then with a wave of his hand, he got in his car and peeled rubber out of the parking lot. I saw the old gentleman pull out his handkerchief and mop his brow as he went back to his car and again looked at the engine. He then went to his wife and spoke with her and appeared to tell her it would be okay. I had seen enough and I approached the old man. He saw me coming and stood straight and as I got near him I said, 'Looks like of you're having a problem.' He smiled sheepishly and quietly nodded his head. I looked under the hood myself and knew that whatever the problem was, it was beyond me. Looking around I saw a gas station up the road and told the old man that I would be right back. I drove to the station and went inside and saw three attendants working on cars. I approached one of them and related the problem the old man had with his car and offered to pay them if they could follow me back down and help him. The old man had pushed the heavy car under the shade of a tree and appeared to be comforting his wife. When he saw us he straightened up and thanked me for my help. As the mechanics diagnosed the problem (overheated engine) I spoke with the old gentleman. When I shook hands with him earlier he had noticed my Marine Corps ring and had commented about it, telling me that he had been a Marine too. I nodded and asked the usual guestion, 'What outfit did you serve with?' He had mentioned that he served with the first Marine Division at Tarawa, Saipan, Iwo Jima and Guadalcanal He had hit all the big ones and retired from the Corps after the war was over. As we talked we heard the car engine come on and saw the mechanics lower the hood. They came over to us as the old man reached for his wallet, but was stopped by me and I told him I would is just put the bill on my AAA card. He still reached for the wallet and handed me a card that I assumed had his name and address on it and I stuck it in my pocket. We all shook hands all around again and I said my goodbye's to his wife. I then told the two mechanics that I would follow them back up to the station. Once at the station I told them that they had interrupted their own jobs to come along with me and help the old man. I said I wanted to pay for the help, but they refused to charge me. One of them pulled out a card from his pocket looking exactly like the card the old man had given to me. Both of the men told me then, that they were Marine Corps Reserves. Once again we shook hands all around and as I was leaving, one of them told me I should look at the card the old man had given to me. I said I would and drove off. For some reason I had gone about two blocks when I pulled over and took the card out of my pocket and looked at it for a long, long time. The name of the old gentleman was on the card in golden leaf and under his name....... 'Congressional Medal of Honor Society.' I sat there motionless looking at the card and it reading it over and over. I looked up from the card and smiled to no one but myself and marveled that on this day, four Marines had all come together, because one of us needed help. He was an old man all right, but it felt good to have stood next to greatness and courage and an honor to have been in his presence. 'Remember, old men like him gave you FREEDOM for America'

ROBERT CHRIS CHUOKE, JR., A Memorial Service

As reported in the last issue, Bob died on November 23rd after a long battle with multiple myeloma (cancer of the bone). Here is some more information about Bob. He was born on September 20, 1929 in Galveston, the only child of Robert Chris Chuoke, Sr. and Mary Lee Ranieri. Bobby, Jr. (as he was called in his youth) graduated from Ball High School in 1947, Wharton County Jr. College in 1950 and University of Houston in 1954. At WCJC Bob was a member of the National Championship football team. He played for the Houston Cougars where he was named to the All Missouri Valley Conference team, Honorable Mention All American and the A. H. Ehlers Best All Around Lineman. He earned his BBA in Business in 1954 and then served in the U.S. Army at Ft. Hood before being drafted by the Detroit Lions in 1956 where he played a year for the Toronto Beachers. Bob played for Bear Bryant in the Blue-Gray Game following his senior season at U of H. Bob was married to his sweetheart, Henriette, whom he met at WCJC, after both graduated from U of H. First making their home in Galveston where Bob joined his father's plumbing business and then moving to Clear Lake following the announcement of NASA in 1964, Bob founded Clear Lake Realty, Inc. which eventually became one of the largest real estate brokerages in the area. Henriette died in 1999 following 45 years of marriage to Bob, leaving Bob and three children, Robert Chris Chuoke, III, Diane Chuoke and David Chuoke. These children, spouses of Chris and David and two grandsons, Robert Chris Chuoke, IV and David Henry Chuoke survived Bob as did his best pal Prissy the cat.



POLIO ERADICATION UPDATE

After 20 years of hard work, Rotary and its partners are in the brink of eradicating this tenacious disease. When only a few years ago world polio was by the tens of thousands, this year the total polio world count is of 1,491, but a strong push is needed now to root it out once and for all. This is a window of opportunity of historic proportions. "The eradication of Polio will be one of the most significant public health accomplishments in history and we are committed to help reach this Rotary goal", said Bill Gates when the Bill & Melinda Gates Foundation awarded a \$100 million grant to the RI Foundation. The grant calls for Rotary to match the \$100 million over the next three years. Every club and every Rotarian participation is needed. The Space Center Rotary Club has set a goal of at least \$20 per member to go to Polio Eradication. The purchase by every club member of one book of District raffle tickets will get us to reach the goal. It will also get us to meet our goal of \$100 per member for the "Every Rotarian Every Year" contribution to the Annual Programs Fund. This money also counts towards Paul Harris Fellow credits. Let's everyone in the club buy at least one book of raffle tickets! Hey! you may even win a \$5,000 travel voucher besides contributing to a worth while cause!


