SHRIMPOREE REPORT....

Final figures on this years Shrimporee are still incomplete because some members have not turned in their ticket money. However, it appears that we had the most profitable Auction to date and the second most profitable overall Shrimporee (best was in 1979). Here are the preliminary figures: In the food lines we collected tickets from 2,180 adults and 337 children (including the Scouts from HCYV). We had the assistance of 57 volunteers not counting Rotary family members and the Boy Scouts.


PROGRAMS



ROTARY FOUNDATION ESTABLISHES ENDOWMENT FOR WORLD UNDERSTANDING AND PEACE.....

The Rotary Foundation has initiated a "planned giving" program to create an endowment fund, known as The Rotary Foundation Endowment for World Understanding and Peace. Its purpose: to lend stability to the Foundation's growth and aid the Trustees in long-range planning. Designed to encourage bequests and major gifts, the program was officially launched in the USCB Region in July, 1982.

Annual giving by generous Rotarians, primarily in the form of Paul Harris Fellow contributions, will still remain the Foundation's lifeblood, but the endowment fund is a means of generating a permanent and predictable income. While annual donations are soon spent to implement the Foundation's programs, planned gifts will be used to build up an endowment fund from which only investment earnings will be spent annually, leaving the principal intact. In this way a donor can perpetuate his annual contribution. For example, if he has given \$100 annually in the past he can insure this contribution "forever" by donating \$1,000 to the endowment fund that would be invested at ten percent.

A planned gift will not only allow a Rotarian to make a significant contribution, but it also has major tax advantages in some countries, and can be made in a way that can create a lifelong income for him or his designated heirs.

Those who contribute major gifts to the endowment fund (be they individuals, corporations, or institutions) have the privilege of designating how their contributions will be used. For example, an endowment scholarship can be named to honor the donor (or another of his/her choice) and could become a perpetual annual award, such as "The John Adams Rotary Foundation Scholarship."
