Do you want to be a success? Here are ten commandments to help you reach your goal-but every one of them will require you to change your thinking first. To be successful, you must think positively. Discouragement comes easy without additional tools to augment thinking positively. The following ten tools can guide you toward success:

Tool Number One: Expect the best. Picture a child just before Christmas. He says—and believes it absolutely—"Santa Claus is bringing me a bike." He doesn't worry about how Santa will load in a single pack all the bicycles he will deliver Christmas Eve, or how he will get the bike down the chimney. The parent may argue that Santa can't afford it or that it is too hard to deliver. Never mind. The child doesn't take no for an answer.

Do you take no for an answer to your desires? When you make the sales call, know that you will be successful. Or, when applying for a job, know that you are the best employee ever, and know that the job is yours. Cultivate an "I know it is going to happen" attitude. Have your hair stand on end with anticipation. When you expect the best to happen, things go your way.

Tool Number Two: Pretend a little. Pretend that you are the greatest. Pretending means "acting as if." It is creative use of the imagination. Act as if you are the best at whatever you do. Stand up straight; hold your head up. Be the greatest! Look how far Muhammed Ali went with pretend-

Affirm to yourself, "I am the best salesman in the company, in the world!" Imagine what it would be like to be the best and step into that role. Pretending is a step to making it so.
