Houston chief of police, Elizabeth Watson, speaks before the Space Center Rotary club October 15th about "neighborhood policing". This new and inovative policy is leading the world in personal and productive law enforcment. Chief Watson explained how every policy and directive is being revamped to reflect the new "root cause" methods that the Houston police are attempting to achieve.

Sne stressed that results of activities are more important than statistics. This enlargement of the scope of the police department beyond law enforcement should result in safer streets and better wellbeing in the city.

When responding to a question about the "early release program" that was being implimented in Houston, she stressed that it was a state problem that only the Texas legislature could correct.

The answer to the first question is deceptively easy. Our community needs true Rotarians. Not "networking" Rotarians or "weekly-meetingsare-enough-service-for-me" Rotarians. Rather, our community needs "service-above-self" Rotarians.

What kind of Rotary Club has

that kind of Rotarian? It is a club which takes great care in evaluating prospective members, ensuring that they understand the nature of Rotary before joining. It is a club which gives new members a thorough orientation so they will quickly assimilate and find appropriate service avenues. It is a club which provides opportunity and encouragement for its members to demonstrate the concept of "service above self."

What can I do to make my club that kind of club? Most important, I must be a "service-above-self" Rotarian. Second, I must call on other Rotarians to help with Rotary service projects, giving them the opportunity to find ways in which they can serve.




