



- 3) U.S. Troop Relief—Many troops which are from the Houston area are now stationed in Saudi Arabia. Interact plans to communicate with and send care packages to these Houstonians.
- 4) Elementary School Scholarships—The pursuit of education above and beyond what is required is not rewarded in the early years of education. Interact hopes to meet this need by offering scholarships to elementary school students who read the most books in their grade (We feel reading is the foundation of learning).
- 5) Scavenger Hunt—Interact sponsors these events periodically during the year to raise food for local charities. Last year, our scavenger hunt raised several hundred dollars in food in only a few hours.
- 6) Blood Drive—Early next year, Interact will begin a community biood drive to help alleviate the dire shortage of blood at local blood banks. Without this blood, many

Officer's Corner

President Billy, by virtue of his position, was tapped first, followed in the last issue by President-Elect, Jack. The next guy in the pecking order of officers was "Yours Truly". When I asked Robin what he wanted me to write about, he said, "anything you want". That's the toughest subject imaginable. After much procrastination and thought, I finally decided to write about the thing that is nearest and dearest to my heart--working with young people.

My volunteer career in working with troubled youngsters began in 1974 at Boys Harbor, then spread to Juvenile Court Volunteers in 1978, then to Friends of Students in 1989. and Bridgeport Communities in Schools in 1990. I am still affiliated with all these agencies and still work with kids and adults who I have met through these groups. I say "adults" because over the course of 16 years, they do grow up. One of my "kids" is now a junior in college in Califor-

nia. All of the kids I have worked with are from broken homes. In some cases, there was a stepfather present, but never was there a close relationship between the boy and the stepfather. The other constant in all these situations was the low esteem of the child. I somehow think there is a casual relationship between these factors. A boy needs a positive adult role model and influence in his life in order to find a direction and motivation. So many of these things that we take for granted are totally foreign to some of these youngsters. I am reminded of the 13 year old I took on vacation several years ago. He could not believe that hotels provided towels, and had televisions and telephones. A 14 year old who I took for a birthday dinner had never eaten steak in a restaurant, and had no idea how to order it or how he wanted it cooked. When the waiter asked him, he replied, "all the way, I quess."

Working with these special young people is a lesson in life. They teach me and I teach them. It is the most rewarding and fulfilling expreience in the world, and it is also the easiest. There is only one qualification - you have to care. Most of these kids need only to know that someone gives a damn. It is amazing what a difference that makes in a young person's life. It is also amazing what a difference it makes in your own life, when you share yourself with a child in need of a friend.

The purpose of this article is not to toot my own horn, but to share information and maybe plant a seed in some minds. If you truly believe in "service above self" and are looking for a place to get involved, I encourage you to contact a youth related agency and volunteer some time. You can really change the direction of a child's life and make your own personal investment in the future.


