

- AUG. 14 Club Assembly. THIS FRIDAY! Committee chairmen need to be ready to present committee plans to Governor Ellis.



INTERNATIONAL YOUTH EXCHANGE

In addition to the program featured last Monday, Karen Birchenough furnished the BLASTOFF this insight: We don't send our exchange students unprepared. By means of an orientation camp and other get togethers the students are introduced to public speaking skills, reminded about their Texas and American history, briefed on more prominent current events around the world. They are educated on the importance of being an ambassador for their family, for their country and for their Rotary Club. They get tips on how to interact with their host families and how to express appreciation for all the considerations being given to them.

Twenty seven American students from D-FW. Houston and East Texas have completed the orientation and are preparing to live in thirteen different countries, including England, Belgium, France, Denmark, Norway, Sweden, Germany, Hungary, Turkey, Japan and Brazil.

PROGRAM NOTES:

July 27: Our own Steve Waldner reported on the revisions to the United Way of America and its new relationship with the local United Ways, including a more clearly defined mission, more direct representation of local United Ways and more volunteers and professionals on oversight committees.

As your editor, I want to exercise a prerogative and relate to you a recent experience I had with the United Way. I recently hired a young man who, I soon discovered, was a genuine homeless person. I had never been that close to one. -- He was sleeping in his car with all his few possessions in The car was in a regular state of disfunction. It was the back seat. keeping him broke so that he never could get together enough to rent an apartment (with the requirements for advance payment of rent and security deposit). His family would not take him in. His young wife-to-be was pregnant, and that was another cash drain. Yet he was a good worker when he could keep his mind off his problems. -- I wanted to help, but I did not know how to go about it. I had already advanced him more money than made sense.-- I called Steve Waldner for guidance. He sees these problems so often that he knew who could do what and he made things happen. By the cooperation of the various groups that work with United Way the cycle was broken. I was amazed at the speed of response. It showed me the value of the professional performance of the United Wav! -- Thank you, Steve Waldner.

AUG. 3: (adapted from notes by Steve Bolton).

Dr William Martin, Sociology Professor, Rice University, discussed the success of Evangelist Billy Graham: what he has accomplished and how he brought it about. You know many of his accolades. The basis of his success, Dr. Martin, who has first hand knowledge, attributes to three things steadfastly adhered to: simplicity, organization and personality. He uses a simple non-denominational theology, a few simple points repeated over and over. "Preaches so that even children can understand." He recruits and submits to a strong board of successful Christian business leaders. No one who can benefit financially is on his board. His personality embodies traits of US culture: self-made, uses latest technology, has small town charisma, and is able to inspire people to follow him out of love and admiration. Dr. Martin's book "Prophet With Honor" gives you more insight into this unusual man.

SOMETHING YOU NEED TO KNOW (but may not know)

From the Rotary Club Constitution:

SECTION 4-Termination-- Non-Payment of Dues. .1 Any member failing to pay his dues within thirty (30) days after the prescribed time shall be notified in writing by the secretary at his last known address. If the dues are not paid on or before ten (10) days from the date of notification said membership shall automatically terminate.

.2 Such former member, at the discretion of the board, may be reinstated to membership upon his petition, and upon payment of all his indebtedness to the club, provided that no former member can be reinstated to active membership if his former classification has been filled.




