

MEETING OF 9/14: Vic Maria stood in for prexy Terry Hesson, who was
rumored to be out throwing money to the winds of Las Vegas. Al Ligrani
handled the ceremony to make Ed Geissler our newest Paul Harris Fellow.
Congratulations, Ed. - - Keith Cook became the newest graduate of the
Red Badge Program. We Boy Scouts practiced on merit badges, eh, Keith?
- - Bert Kraft invited submission of new member nominations and
reminded sponsors to follow through to assure that the member they
sponsored gets fully integrated into club activities.

Mary Wylie introduced our guest speaker, Judge John Kyles, reported to be the "best qualified criminal district judge standing for election". His talk showed he had a real grasp of the problems as well as intelligent solutions to offer. Judge Kyles pointed out that 10 % of the criminal population commit 50% of the crimes. Drug abusers commit 60 % of all crimes. And youthful offenders are ill prepared with morals, values or discipline to be successful. - - - With the downsizing of the army, the military alternative is no longer available. It ends up that youthful offenders learn from the 10% of sociopaths in county jail. Half of the people in Harris County jail serve their entire sentence there- and there is NO REHABILITATION IN HARRIS COUNTY JAIL.

Judge Kyles' solutions: 1. Lock up the 10 % heavy repeaters for as long as possible. Find a way past Wm. Wayne Justice's population cap, recognizing that Federal penitentiaries allow 160 % of design capacity while in Texas the limit is 95 %. 2. Use alternatives to jail expansion for youthful offenders. 3. Institute substance abuse rehabilitation needed for drug abusers. And start the program for an abuser as soon as possible after he is identified as one rather than waiting until he has been through the revolving door a few times.

MEETING OF 9/21: Governor Bob Ellis visited us as part of his showing around John Osterman from RI Headquarters in Evanston, III. Terry Hesson took the opportunity to tell Gov. Bob about the new program we are pioneering for Interact in <u>Junior</u> High School. Tery Hernandez has taken the responsibility for this work, which is believed to be the first effort of its kind in Rotary anywhere.

The bulk of this meeting was devoted to status reports of Shrimporee committee chairmen. Lo and behold! Everything seemed to be well in hand and everybody was just waiting for Saturday. Shrimporee Chair Donnie Johnson was just bubbling over.

Some of the committee chairmen were out playing in the Shrimporee Golf Tournament, but some of the reports heard went like this: Jon Hall said the cole slaw situation was stable now but expected it to be thoroughly mixed up by Friday night. A. B. Olsen (chairs and tables) moved that we table the commotion. Ken Goedeke (clean-up) said he couldn't wait for Saturday night. Bill Tuite (aprons and towels) withdrew his offer to provide crying towels if anything went wrong. Danielle Dupuis modeled a handsome new Rotary apron and sold me one on the spot. Dave Baldwin (tickets) wanted our tickets or our money or some of each. Don Kyle solicited meal tickets for giving to his young parking help--(free nearby parking not included). Eddie Janek was finalizing our first ever Shrimporee ad book. #### SHRIMPOREES DON'T JUST HAPPEN!

There are over 30 committees that have to be chaired, staffed, trained, motivated, coordinated and supplied. Fortunately, we don't start entirely from scratch every year. Our history carries us.

One part of that history is embodied in the Logistics committee, headed in recent years by Alan Wylie. You may not see this work, for much of it happens before and after the main part of the Shrimporee. But all the supplies have to magically appear in time for use and have to be later returned to an orderly storage for use the next year. It wasn't always an orderly process, but now we have a storage shed with floor to ceiling shelving and a place for everything. What's more Alan keeps computerized inventory of the materials needed by each committee and what's on hand.

Alan says that because the supplier to the Logistics committee is not open Saturday afternoon, the practice is to assume a maximum attendance of 3500 each year and obtain supplies for that number.

The logistics work is broken down into ten key dates with two to six actions on each. The work fires up a month before the Shrimporee and the committee tries to have everything buttoned up and in storage and paid for by a week after the Shrimporee.

It's a lot of work, but Alan is a nice guy and I am sure you can call him if your daughter left her dolly behind or if you left your sun glasses.


