MAKING A DIFFERENCE -- A "MOVING" STORY

Carlos said: "JON, PUT ME ON HOLD, NOW! MAKE A CALL! the ox is in the ditch! We've got to move that medical equipment now or lose it."

--(Editor's note: While Carlos is on hold and Jon Hall is madly dialing connections, let me bring you up to date. The August 10 Blastoff said "thanks" to our donors of medical equipment to be sent to Mexico and told you who they were. But the intended recipients in Mexico could not seem to make things happen. And those storing the equipment for free were running out of space and understandably short on patience from repeated postponements.)--

In an example of the power of the Rotary world, Jon's call to his district connection, Don Oelfke, yielded almost immediate fruit in the form of a reference to Quinton Sieck, a member of the Astrodome Rotary club, just back from Monterey. With a call from Sieck, the Monterey, Mexico Rotary club leaped at the opportunity to provide the hospital beds and other equipment to their local senior citizens rest home project, the House of Mercy. The Monterey club would arrange free trucking to Monterey, in a truck that would otherwise make an empty return trip to Monterey, provided we could act quickly.

Carlos and Jon did act quickly and it can now be announced that the project has been accomplished. See the smiling faces in the photo below: That's Jon and Quinton with the crew Quinton brought, after they finished stuffing the 18-wheeler. (Carlos says it's the biggest truck he has ever seen.) THANKS, Carlos, Jon and Quinton! It couldn't have happened without you.

(Another Editor's Note: The medicines rounded up in the project could not, it turned out, be taken into Mexico, but they were sent instead via the Nassau Bay Police Dept. to the hurricane relief in Louisiana).

TEACHER'S AWARD COMMITTEE REPORT


The Teacher's Award Committee has begun the selection process for the annual Excellence in Education Awards. The committee has received 69 total nominations for 59 different teachers. These nominations will be carefully reviewed before the holidays and 10-20 of the teachers will be asked to submit a detailed application. Six teachers will then be selected for Certificates of Excellence in Education. The outstanding teacher from this group will receive the Space Center Rotary Club Award for Excellence in Education and a cash prize of \$1000, plus being named a Paul Harris Fellow, an Honorary member of Space Center Rotary, plus publicity, and plaques for permanent display.

The 69 nominations came from 21 different schools: 14 from three high schools; 23 from six intermediate schools; and 32 from twelve elementary schools. This much response from the schools tells us that they value this recognition program.

Carlos Villagomez. (An interview by Tom Wier).

The take-charge man we see today was born in one of the barrios of Southeast Houston, those priest-centered, large familied groups of Mexican Americans. He was "number 6 of 13" in his family. He remembers there were no organized sports in the barrios, so for entertainment he and other kids would catch "free" rides on the steam engined freight trains going from Houston to Webster, running along the tops of the boxcars, jumping from car to car ahead of a pursuing railroad employee. The docks of the Port of Houston were closeby and lots of available work lured many away from the schools. Carlos' father would not stand for it. When Carlos finished school he joined the navy. That was 1953. He really did see the world for 4-1/2 years. He said he learned to work hard, had a lot of fun, and knows it was very good for him. In 1955 Carlos married Rachel. So they have now been married 37 years, have two sons, Carlos Jr. and Adolph, and a daughter Roni. But that is not the end of the story.

Carlos went to Barber School, then worked for some prominent Houston barber shops. The more he saw of life the more he became determined that his children should not be stifled by the closeness of the barrio life style. He moved to Clear Lake in 1969 and now claims "everything I know today I learned on NASA Rd. 1." And an affable, energetic fellow in the barber business can get to know a lot of people and what they are like. Carlos has been or is a director of the Chamber of Commerce; served planning and zoning for the City of Webster; a Rotarian for 18 years; served on the grand jury; a director of the Clear Creek Education Foundation; and a member of St. Paul Catholic Church in Nassau Bay.

Carlos likes to learn and to apply himself to challenging projects. He is proud of having paid a builder \$2500 to show him how to read bids, etc. so that he could act as builder of his own house, which he did a very nice job on. He was smart enough to practice on a smaller speculative house first! He doesn't consider himself a builder but he does have a knack for making a profit whatever the project!

A final insight: When Alan Shepard was returning from the moon, he called Carlos from space to make a hair appointment. Every reporter from Germany to Webster besieged Carlos for info on Alan. It was then that Carlos dubbed Alan "the Joe Namath of the Astronauts".----AND when the movie "Hell Fighter", the story of Red Adair, starring John Wayne, was made in Houston, Carlos was the hair stylist for John Wayne and the rest of the cast. ----So what have you been doing lately?



DRUG AWARENESS ESSAY CONTEST

The school essay contest that we originated has become district wide. This year 52 Rotary Clubs of Rotary District 5890 participating in the on-going drug awareness program. No other Rotary district in the world has a program nearly as large or as successful. This year our message will reach between 50,000 and 60,000 eighth grade students in 31 school districts within our 9-county region.

Our own Dr. Carson Stephens heads the district effort and hopes that we can find those who will consider sharing in the funding of this project. It costs ~\$11,000 to conduct the program (only about \$0.24/ child). The program is cumulative. By the end of this school year over 180,000 children will have participated.


