



A Special Message from RI President Richard D. King

On behalf of 1.2 million Rotarians in 163 countries of the world, I want to extend my heartfelt condolences to the victims and families of the tragic events of 11 September 2001. At this early stage, we do not yet know what losses our own Rotary family may have experienced, but I am quite certain that all Rotarians stand united in offering sympathy and support in these difficult times.

Since this tragedy occurred in the country where our world headquarters is located, Rotary International has received an outpouring of concern from Rotarians throughout the world. To share these con-

cerns and condolences with other members of the Rotary family, we have put these messages on our Web site. This Web page will remain on the site permanently to allow Rotarians to respond to the future disasters that seem almost inevitable in our troubled world.

Many Rotarians have asked us how they can help. We strongly encourage Rotarians to turn to their own individual clubs or local districts for guidance. In the days and weeks ahead, clubs and districts in the New York and Washington, D.C., areas will undoubtedly begin initiating projects to help their communities recover. If you or your club want to provide assistance, the best way is to contact these clubs directly through your own district. Meanwhile, we are suggesting that Rotarians or Rotary clubs consider working with the Red Cross and other organizations that are equipped to respond quickly to such disasters.

These events demonstrate all the more the importance of Rotary's Global Quest to keep our organization growing and thriving. Where Rotary exists in the world, there is a greater chance for peace. By swelling the ranks of Rotarians dedicated to peace, we can further strengthen Rotary's mission to foster international understanding and goodwill.

Gala Promotes Self-Sufficient Families 9 Hens and 1 Lucky Rooster, Trees, Tomatoes, Beans

At the Color of Our Hearts Gala recently Frank Huezo described Nicaragua and the work being done for the victims of Hurricane Mitch, and most notably, children living and eating in the garbage dump. PDG Steve Harris, RI's cochair on the Hunger Task Force, was the Gala Chairman and Chair RI Hunger Task Force along with Carolyn Farb, honorary chair again and Linda Messner. A presentation was shown with a challenge to break the cycle of poverty, one village at a time. Father Marco, speaking English publicly for the first time at the RI Convention this summer in San Antonio, also outlined the contributions by Rotarians on the video.

This year, the Nicaraguan Gala was held at the Hornberger Center on September 22, 2001. Major corporate underwriters included Michael Cordua of America's restaurant fame and Americana Shipping Lines. This year, 100% of the costs of the gala are underwritten, so 100% of your dollars go to the families in Nicaragua!

Yes, members and guests of the Rotary Club of Space Center attended the gala after many hours of supporting our very own Shrimporee fundraiser. None of us stayed around for the dancing later in the evening (we were just so tired!), but we really enjoyed the district fellowship, food, and the program. Attendees from our club were: Bill Lowes, Bill Taylor, David Vaughn, Laura Hale and Sheila Self. Guests included Sharon Lowes, Susan Taylor, Susan Vaughn, and Addie Pope. The Getsamami Children's Choir also performed that evening and our club was also treated to their entertainment at our meeting on Monday, September

You may remember at PDG Painter's conference in Galveston, Texas, Jack Tucker made a presentation about the housing project for the people of the dump. For \$450, Rotarians, friends, and clubs could sponsor a home for a family. Your \$450 contribution was matched by another Non-Governmental Organization (NGO), Food for the Poor, and then the \$900 matched again by RI in a special housing grant, shepherded by PDG Charlie Clemmons. So yes, a home for \$1,800.00 was built; there are approximately 110 of 300 homes completed. Food for the Poor is building the remainder of the homes, which should be completed by October. This project has grown from the first international project for the Humble Intercontinental club five years ago to a large project supported by the majority of the clubs in

District 5890. But what to do once the homes are built?

Rotarians throughout District 5890 have stepped forward again to begin the final step in breaking the cycle of poverty for the families of the Chinendega city dump. This year, proceeds from the gala will be spent on feeding the children at the school for the kids of the city dump (approx. \$90k annually) and the remainder to provide crops and livestock for the villagers.

Each villager should receive fencing and materials for pens, 9 hens and 1 lucky rooster, several lime trees, several papaya trees, several plantain trees, seeds for tomatoes, cucumbers, beans, onions, herbs, etc. The estimated cost for each family is approximately \$600, and the goal is to have each family self-sufficient within the next 6 months. Just like the housing project, each family is responsible for building the fences, pens, and gardens.

BOLIVIA UPDATE

Now that some regularity has settled back in with the airlines, I wanted to let you know of dates I am planning on traveling to Cochabamba.

Depart either: Friday (11/2) or Saturday (11/3) {Note: this is an overnight flight, getting in the next day}

Return either: Friday (11/9), Saturday (11/10), or Sunday (11/11)

My preference will be to make the most of the week out from work, by leaving on the evening of 11/2 and returning on 11/11. Since we have dedicated personnel to help us the whole time we are down there, adjusting your travel times (departing or returning) is most flexible, i.e., we all do not need to travel on the same day. But, since it is more fun going down together, I will be as flexible as need be so everyone is comfortable.

Information you should have in preparing for this trip is as follows:

- 1. Go to the AMISTAD Mission Website (http://amistadmission.org/) and browse the various links to learn about where we will be visiting (Childrens Village and Aramasi), and where we will be living (La Morada).
- 2. Click on "Visit Bolivia" from the Home Page and download a "Visitors' Packet". Here you will learn: History of Amistad, Expected expenses for this trip, Sample Itinerary, Release Forms, Medical Forms and Guidelines, Advice on what to bring with you for the trip
- 3. A roundtrip Coach ticket between Houston and Cochabamba is approx. \$1,100, with American Airlines providing transportation 90% of the way. Although the Bolivian National Airline (LAB) does fly out of Miami (which is the U.S. departure point for American as well, and is approx. \$300 less), I am recommending we fly with a more reliable carrier at this time. For those of you who are departing from a city other than Houston, we will meet up in Miami just prior to leaving for the South American leg of the trip.
- 4. Our time down there will be taken up with:
- Visits to the Childrens Village (where we will commemorate a new Water Well), {2 days} - Excursions into the City for restaurant eating and great shopping, {intermittent} - Site Seeing around Cochabamba {2 days}, and - Travel up to the Andean Village of Aramasi (75 miles outside Chochabamba) for an overnight stay {2 days}. We will be visiting a new school and clinic that AMISTAD has just built for them.
- 5. All your (in Bolivia) ground transportation, food and lodging (at La Morada) will be covered by a \$300 fee for the entire week. This is not due until you arrive at La Morada.
- 6. A couple of inoculations will be required for the trip (and are spelled out in the Visitors Packet). Just make sure you able to take care of them by the middle of October, as some of them take a couple of week to engage. In the past I have used the Herman Hospital Travel Clinic (713.704.4317) for my shots. They are most accommodating.

I would appreciate your delving through all this information and get back to me as soon as you can, so I can make sure ample accommodations await us (Max. 10 visitors per visit). As of right now, confirmed travelers are myself and Franz Josef-Albrecht (from Switzerland). I know that this trip will be a once-in-a-lifetime experience. There will be ample time for personal reflection and retreat during these travels, as this country provides a wealth of stimulus that will cause you to reflect on your life here in the U.S. I look forward to your reply. 
And the birthday is her 19th birthday.



"Trick-or-Treat" campaign materials on their way to U.S. Rotary Clubs

The Polio eradication effort has found a new ally in UNI-CEF's "Trick-or-Treat" fundraiser. At the 2001 Rotary International Convention in San Antonio, UNICEF Executive Director Carol Bellamy announced that all proceeds of the "Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF" campaign for this year and next will go to polio eradication.



Managed by the U.S. Fund for UNICEF — one of 37 national committees set up around the world to raise money for UNICEF - the two-year campaign is in direct support

of the private-sector appeal being jointly sponsored by Rotary and the United Nations Foundation. Rotary clubs throughout the United States are invited to join Rotary, the UN Foundation, and UNICEF in promoting this fundraising event in their local communities. The collection boxes, carried house to house by children on Halloween, will carry the logos of Rotary and the UN Foundation.

Since its inception in 1950 by a group of Philadelphia youth, the "Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF" tradition has enabled U.S. children to collect more than US\$110 million with the trademark orange collection boxes on Halloween. In the past, the funds raised have helped UNICEF provide medicine, clean water and sanitation, nutrition, education, and emergency relief to millions of children in more than 160 countries and territories.

This is the first time in the 51-year history of this premier UNICEF fundraiser that its proceeds will be devoted to a specific cause. In addition to being a wonderful community service project for any Rotary club, the 2001 Trick-or-Treat program is projected to contribute some \$6 million towards the Rotary-UNF private-sector appeal to help fill a \$400 million gap in funding for the Global Polio Eradication Initiative.

"Trick-or-Treat for UNICEF" has taught generations of children in the United States to care about their less advantaged peers around the world and about the importance of compassion and volunteerism. Now, it offers a great opportunity for Rotarians to introduce millions of children to Rotary and its commitment to global service and polio eradication. Rotary clubs are encouraged to begin identifying schools and other groups that work with children, and speak with their leaders about "Trick or Treat for

UNICEF."

A complete package of information about this campaign was to have been sent to Rotary, Rotaract, and Interact club presidents in the United States last week. However, due to the recent tragic events in New York where UNICEF is headquartered, the mailing has been delayed. All U.S. clubs should receive the information by 1 October.

Rotary upheld as model of volunteerism at United Nations event

Rotary International was a participant at the 54th Annual Department of Public Information/Non-Governmental Organizations (NGOs) Conference held at United Nations Headquarters in New York this past week. The event opened on 10 September with addresses by UN Secretary General Kofi Annan and other leaders in the international community.

Based on the theme "NGOs Today: Diversity of the Volunteer Experience" and with the 2001 UN-sponsored International Year of Volunteers (TYV) as its backdrop, the meeting explored issues that challenge the worldwide community of NGOs, many of which are guided by the spirit of volunteerism. In addition, the event focused on the diversity of volunteer experiences around the world, and identified ways in which this spirit can be used more effectively to support the goals and principles of the United Nations.

Speaking on 13 September to an audience representing 150 NGOs and UN agencies, Rotary Foundation Trustee Chairman Luis Vicente Giay highlighted Rotary's experience with the PolioPlus program, which relies on an army of Rotarian volunteers across the world.

Trustee Chairman Giay upheld the Global Polio Eradication Initiative, a partnership between Rotary and other agencies, as a model for cooperation among different organizations in the delivery of international service. "Together with our partners, US Centers for Disease Control and Prevention, the World Health Organization, and the United Nations Children's Fund, Rotarians are confident that we will finish the job of eradicating polio by 2005," he said. "The success of The Rotary Foundation, both in terms of its fundraising and its top caliber programs, is attributable to one common factor: the Rotarian at the grassroots level who desires to make a difference."

Speakers who commended the pioneering role Rotary has played in the war against polio included Sharon Capeling-Alakija, executive coordinator for UN Volunteers, and Gillian Martin Sorenson, UN assistant secretary general for external relations.

In the closing speech, Nane Annan, the UN secretary general's wife, encouraged NGOs to support projects aimed at eradicating preventable diseases. Despite the tragic events on 11 September, which interrupted an event scheduled to have ended on the following day, the conference successfully highlighted the importance of volunteerism in the world.
