The ROTARY Lombardi Award

The Rotary Lombardi Award is hosted by the Rotary Club of Houston and benefits the American Cancer Society. The Award was initiated by the Rotary Club in 1970 shortly after the death of Vince Lombardi to cancer.

The Rotary Lombardi Award goes annually to the college football lineman – offense or defense -- who, in addition to outstanding performance and ability, best exemplifies the discipline of Vince Lombardi. As the legendary coach of the Green Bay Packers, Lombardi first made a name for himself as the smallest but toughest member of Fordham University's "Seven Blocks of Granite," renowned in their day (1934-37) for being the most unyielding line in college football.

Appropriately, the trophy is a 40-pound block of granite atop a silver pedestal built over a foundation of discipline. The symbolic design was created by Houston Rotarian and professional artist, Mark Storm.

A distinguished committee of over 300 of America's most prominent college

football coaches, football writers, sports broadcasters and previous Rotary Lombardi Award winners, participate in a three-tiered balloting process. Each year the selection committee selects twelve semifinalists, four finalists and the ultimate winner in balloting conducted by the accounting firm of KPMG Peat Marwick.

All four finalists, their head coaches and sports information directors are brought to Houston for two days of hospital visits, media interviews and local hospitality. The climax of the trip is the annual Rotary Lombardi Dinner, when the sellout crowd gathers to hear the announcement of the winner. Plans are currently underway for the 2001 Lombardi Dinner, and will be published when made available.

CAPERS HEADLINES 2001 ROTARY LOMBARDI DINNER

Texans Head Coach to Deliver Speech and Present Lombardi Award

Dom Capers, who will lead the Houston Texans into their historic first season of play in the NFL in 2002, will deliver the keynote speech at the 32nd Rotary Lombardi Award Dinner in Houston on December 5. This year's gala event will be held at the J.W. Marriott Hotel in Houston.

Caers is no stranger to the type of talent required to earn the designation of "Lombardi Finalists". In his NFL coaching career, six former Finalists played for Capers (Bruce Clark, , Eric Curry, Jack Del Rio, Ted Gregory, Greg Skrepenak, and Zach Wiegert). In addition, he was on the defensive coaching staff at the University of Tennessee in 1983 when Vols defensive tackle Reggie White was a finalist for the award.

This will be Capers second stint as the head coach of an expansion franchise in the NFL. He compiled a 30-34 record in four seasons with the Carolina Panthers. The Panthers' 7-9 record set an NFL record for most victories by an expansion team. Carolina also posted the first four-game winning streak in expansion history, the first winning home record by an expansion club and the first win over a defending Super Bowl champion (San Francisco) in expansion annals. In 1996, he was named NFC Coach of the Year as he led the Panthers to the NFL Championship game. After leaving the Panthers, he was hired as the Defensive Coordinator for the Jacksonville Jaguars improving their defense from 25th in the NFL in total defense in 1998 to fourth in 1999. He was named as the Texans first head coach on January 21.

"We are pleased and excited to have Coach Capers be our featured speaker this year, " Dinner Chairman Marc Rieke said. "As a former coach of seven Rotary Lombardi Award finalists at both the college and professional level, he is very familiar with the outstanding talent and character required to become a finalist for The Rotary Lombardi Award.

Now in it's 32nd year of honoring the top lineman or linebacker in Division I football, the Rotary Lombardi Award Diner has raised over \$2.5 million for cancer research since it was first held in 1970. "Out of Silence comes Faith. Out of Faith comes Love. Out of Love comes Service Out of Service comes Peace"


This is what Rotary is about, the peace we feel by helping others, from the love in our hearts as we service those in need, sometimes in silence and in never ending faith.
