FIRST REPORT


I am currently attending the Chinese University of Hong Kong (CUHK) in Shatin, New Territories, located in northern Hong Kong. Courses officially began on the 29th of August, though I arrived in Hong Kong a few days beforehand to get settled.

Although I have traveled to Asia before (Vietnam, Singapore, Malaysia and Indonesia), this is my first time to China. Prior to my departure, I attended the Scholar Orientation Seminar in Austin, Texas. The weekend was a great way to prepare for the year abroad, as it gave me a chance to meet other scholars and exchange our experiences and expectations. I also had the opportunity to spend some time with Sharon Williams, my Sponsor Counselor from West U Rotary Club. Both the orientation and my interactions with Sharon, Bill Barmore (Scholarships Chairman of District 5890) and Suzie Howe (DG of District 5890) helped me to understand my role as an Ambassadorial Scholar prior to my departure.

About CUHK

My adjustment to life on campus at CUHK has been surprisingly smooth. Chinese U is the second oldest university in Hong Kong and the campus has a very rich history. I was accepted to two other universities in Hong Kong (Hong Kong University and Hong Kong University of Science and Technology), but I am actually very glad that I decided to come to CUHK in the end. The campus is the biggest in HK and it is situated 45 minutes from downtown, away from the hustle and bustle of the city. The scenery itself is quite amazing. I am constantly surrounded by mountains, lakes, ponds and lots of greenery. That being said, the hills on campus make going to class very interesting! I'm also getting used to dorm life. I have a small, single room at the "Jockey Club" postgraduate dorms on campus. The dorms are filled with local and international students pursuing various graduate degrees, everything from JDs to Doctorates in Chinese Medicine. The nice thing about the dorms is that the majority of my MBA classmates live there so we often study, eat and spend our free time together. This has been such an important aspect of my life here since it has provided me with a great support group.

The MBA Program

I am enrolled in the full-time MBA program at the graduate business school. My MBA class consists of 23 students from very diverse backgrounds. There are students from Germany, India, mainland China, Taiwan and Hong Kong. Each of us has a unique educational background and work experience so we've all been able to learn from each other, both inside and outside of the classroom.

In the beginning of the semester, the entire class went on an outdoor team-building program called Outward Bound. The 5-day program took place in Sai Kung (northeast Hong Kong) and consisted of an intensive hiking/kayaking/camping course. The program was focused on developing problem-solving, team-building and leadership skills and required a lot of physical and mental strength from all the participants. My entire class was able to successfully finish the program, and in the process, we developed strong bonds as teammates and friends. The Outward Bound program really set the foundation for our studies since it gave us an impression of how we'll work together as a group in the upcoming months.



District 5890 Rotary Tour

Many of us first met Jerry Traylor when he addressed our President elect training Conference this past March. On January 18, Jerry is scheduled to address the annual banquet for the El Campo Chamber of Commerce. We are looking at extending Jerry's visit so that some of our communities can hear Jerry's message.

As many of you recall from the Lonestar PETS conference, Jerry was born with cerebral palsy and uses crutches, but actually jogged across America on those crutches. In addition, he has climbed to the top of 14,000 foot Pikes Peak in Colorado. His message and accompanying PowerPoint visual is moving. Jerry makes his living as a speaker and has addressed numerous Fortune 500 companies. See jerrytraylor.com for more information.

Generally Jerry gets fees ranging up to \$5000 for the corporate market and close to \$1000 for a day at schools. However, Jerry has agreed to a special Rotary fee of \$600 a day for our area. This fee is only available for schools, youth programs and non-profits.

The dates and length of the tour are flexible. He could arrive via Hobby Airport as early as January 14 and stay until January 23, depending on the number of clubs that wish to hear him. There will be three different opportunities for using Jerry's message.

- An evening fundraiser could be organized which would be open to the community. A fee would be charged and monies raised would go towards a fee for Jerry and Rotary foundation or community projects. The fee could be as low as \$5 or considerable more if snacks or a meal were included. Smaller communities would expect less attendance and Jerry is willing to work with them on a lesser fee if need be.
- Rotary could sponsor said event and offer it free to the community to promote goodwill and increase awareness of Rotary and the good they do. A good opportunity here would be in the form of corporate sponsors for the whole day - three @ \$500 gives Jerry his fee, plus, extra for promotions and auditorium rentals. This provides 100% of what remains for Rotary projects.
- Rotary either in conjunction with an evening program would sponsor Jerry into the local schools. Generally Jerry will do a program in the morning for one age level or school and in the afternoon for a nearby school or different age level. He would then do an evening program for no additional cost which would be directed towards parents, Rotarians, and the rest of the community.

Jerry's school programs are powerful, but it is suggested that you ask school leadership, i.e. the principal or Superintendent to take partial ownership, and pay half of the fee, (\$300) as they generally have funding for substance abuse prevention or character education programming.

Rotary could bring Jerry in and donate his services to non-profit agencies that need some hope and inspiration. In the past, Rotarians have sponsored Jerry's message at Youth Detention Centers, United Way campaigns, Women in safe Homes, Prisons, and countless others. Be creative in this area. Jerry really wants to make a difference.

There may be an opportunity for Jerry to present the weekly Club program, though this should be a low priority as it is our intent to bring a great Rotary opportunity to others in our community. Your club would also host Jerry with lodging and food, either in a Rotary home or Hotel.

Please contact me, Charlie Thorp, at (713) 862-4404 directly or Jerry at (480) 837-9408, if your club is interested in being part of this tour. We will act on a first come basis and close the opportunity out by January 1, so act promptly.

District 5890 2006-07 Multi-Club Project

The Rotary East End Initiative has been successful in establishing several public health projects including Back-to-School Immunization Events, the Espiritu de Salud/Spirit of Health Mobile Health Unit, the El Centro de Corazon Pediatric Room and most recently the El Centro After Hours Urgent Care program. The Initiative is now broadening its reach to include education activities.

Please join District Governor Suzi Howe in her vision to support a Montessori program in the Casa de los Ninos Barbara Bush – a state of the art literacy center that will be part of a major expansion for the Community Family Center and make a huge difference for East End families. This multi-club project will equip a Montessori classroom and also establish a ROTARY PARK in the St. Luke's playground that adjoins the Casa de los Ninos Barbara Bush and the John D. McGovern Gymnasium.

DG Suzi has already pledged \$25,000 from District funds and is asking interested Rotary clubs and individual Rotarians to also contribute funds. Rotary's partner, St. Luke's Episcopal Health Charities, will support these efforts with a challenge grant to match the Rotary funds raised for this project. Donations of \$1000 and higher from Rotary clubs and individual donors will be recognized on a plaque in the Rotary Park.

An untapped source of members: program alumni

Every year, Rotary International and The Rotary Foundation invest significant amounts of time and money in their programs. In 2004-05, Rotary clubs and districts provided leadership training for more than 20,000 young people through Rotary Youth Leadership Awards (RYLA), supported about 410,000 service-minded youth in Interact and Rotaract clubs, and provided study-abroad opportunities for more than 10,000 students and young professionals through Rotary Youth Exchange, Ambassadorial Scholarships, and Group Study Exchange (GSE).

These programs not only attract the best and brightest young people but also produce individuals committed to leadership, service, and international understanding. Often, the people who participate in these programs become contributing members of their communities and share the values they learned in Rotary with the rest of the world.

Because of their dedication to Rotary's values, these program alumni could make great Rotarians. They are already more familiar with Rotary than the average prospective club member, and their participation in Rotary's programs indicates that they are interested in the organization's objectives. Why not capitalize on their experience with Rotary and get a return on the investment by keeping them involved in Rotary as club members?

According to research conducted in 2005-06 by the Membership Development Division of Rotary International, only 2.9% of current Rotarians are program alumni. Additionally

- 58% of clubs say they don't recruit program alumni for membership.
- 22% of clubs claim to recruit alumni *and* actually have alumni as members.
- 84% of current program participants are interested in joining a Rotary club.

66% of program alumni are interested in joining a Rotary club. So, why aren't more alumni joining Rotary clubs?

RI's research found that as more years pass after alumni leave a program, fewer and fewer of those alumni remain interested in joining a Rotary club. This decline in interest over time could stem from a significant decline in contact with Rotary, which was shown to occur once participants finished with their program. Alumni who had more frequent contact with Rotary after their program generally were more interested in joining a club than were alumni who had less frequent contact.

Considering the large number of new alumni each year, Rotary has tremendous growth potential, especially if these alumni were more effectively transitioned into Rotary clubs. Clubs and districts can implement many strategies to tap into alumni as a source of potential members:

- **Build strong relationships with current program participants.** It's important to instill a "connection for life" with Rotary among program participants.
- **Develop an action plan for keeping alumni involved in Rotary activities and for transitioning them into Rotary clubs.** This could include appointing an alumni subcommittee to manage tasks like tracking and maintaining contact with alumni.
- **Promote alumni so other Rotarians understand their importance.** No matter how great alumni are, if other Rotarians don't see them as potential members, they won't treat them as potential members.
- **Ask alumni to join and continue asking even if an initial invitation is declined.** Many alumni are waiting for clubs to contact them, but many clubs are waiting for alumni to contact them.
- **Help alumni find clubs that meet their needs.** Sometimes alumni decline invitations to join because a club doesn't meet their specific needs. The alumni may need a club that meets at a different time or place.
- **Use alumni to start new clubs.** If alumni are having difficulty finding a club that meets their needs, clubs and districts could start new clubs.
- **Involve alumni in other programs.** Clubs and districts can help maintain interest among alumni by getting them involved in other Rotary programs.
- **Involve alumni in club and district activities.** Many of the alumni who aren't yet ready to join a Rotary club still want to be involved in Rotary activities.
