District Conference Awards

District Governor Suzi Howe presented three major Rotary awards at the 2007 District 5890 Conference in Puerto Vallarta.

Jim Kite and PDG Andy Smallwood received the Rotary International Service Above Self Award and PDG D'Lisa Simmons received the Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service.

The Rotary International Service Above Self Award is an internationally competitive award granted to a maximum of 150 Rotarians per year who are examples of Service Above Self. The nominee must have demonstrated exemplary humanitarian service, in any form and at any level, with an emphasis on personal volunteer efforts and active involvement in helping others through Rotary. A district is limited to two such awards in a Rotary year, and District 5890 is one of only a few districts in the Rotary world to be awarded two recipients.

Jim Kite has, for many years, been heavily involved our district project in Chinandega, Nicaragua, assisting the Children of the Dump, and attempting to break the cycle of poverty for their families and others. He has also participated in Group Study Exchange, as the team leader to Nicaragua, and has hosted several Youth Exchange students. He is the recipient of the Rotary Foundation District Service Award, serves on the Board of Directors, Executive Committee, and as Secretary of Hope and Relief International Foundation, Inc., is a Paul Harris Society member, and serves in many other civic activities outside of Rotary, including the Houston Livestock Show and Rodeo, the Southeast Harris County Economic

Development Council, and the San Jacinto College Foundation. Jim is a multiple Paul Harris Fellow and a Benefactor of The Rotary Foundation.

PDG Andy Smallwood has served as mentor and resource to District Governors inside and outside of our district since his term as District Governor in 1995-96. He has hosted several Youth Exchange Students, sponsored a number of matching grants, reviewed a literacy project in the Mexico City prison, participated in the Guerrero Eye Clinic, a National Immunization Day for polio in Nepal, and promoted a free enterprise seminar in Mexico City. Andy also created and conducted the first Zone 25/26 District Governor Nominee training, created the Rotary Multi-District leadership Institute, and has been an inspirational speaker in over 19 Rotary districts. He is a Major Donor and member of the Paul Harris Society. He has also been active in his community, serving on the board of the Living Bank, the University of Houston Educational Foundation and the City of Pasadena Housing Commission.

The Rotary Foundation Citation for Meritorious Service is awarded to one Rotarian from each district by the Rotary Foundation Trustees each year, to recognize Rotarians who have rendered significant service to The Rotary Foundation.

PDG D'Lisa Simmons began her relationship with the Rotary Foundation as an Ambassadorial Scholar to Singapore.

As a Rotarian, she has served as our Centennial District Governor in 2004-05, as the chair and a member of the District Rotary Foundation Committee, as the chair, member and host for Group Study Exchange, member

Kingwood Rotary Paints Pinkies Purple



For just one dollar, students and staff at Park Lakes Elementary joined the fight against polio as they got their pinkies finger-painted purple.

They joined the Purple Pinkie Project along with members of the Kingwood Rotary and Quest High School Interact Club by donating money to help children in other countries receive the oral polio vaccine.

The event took place inside of the school's cafeteria. "For every dollar that the children donated, it helped at least two other children in other countries. The students at Park Lakes Elementary did not receive the vaccine, they just had their pinkies painted purple or received a piece of purple yarn that was tied around their wrist by Quest High School students. The purple served as a reminder for them of their effort to help protect other children against the virus," said Tommie Buscemi with the Kingwood Rotary Club.

The color purple that was painted or tied on the students is very similar to what impoverished children receive after they get the polio vaccine.

Each year, millions of Rotary International members participate in the National Immunization Day in which they go into the villages where it is needed and distribute the oral vaccine. Once a child has received it, their pinkie is painted with a gentian violet dye that lasts for at least three days so a volunteer can recognize who received the medicine to prevent double dosage.

"Being involved in this effort gives our students an opportunity at an early age to help others in some way. It teaches them compassion for others and no matter what is going on at home there is always someone else who will need their help. We are just glad to be a part of this program," said Sarah Ballard, principal of Park Lakes Elementary.

This is not Kingwood Rotary's first time going into a school looking for donations. In the past, they have partnered with Bear Branch Elementary, Woodland Hills Elementary and other schools. Through the efforts of the students and staff at Park Lakes, they were able to raise \$255. All money raised will be donated to the Rotary International's PolioPlus program, in which \$600 million has been raised.

"It costs 60 cents for each child to receive the vaccine so with every dollar, they helped two children. When we started, polio existed in 125 countries but today it still exists in four of them," Buscemi said.

The virus is still affecting children's lives in Pakistan, Afghanistan, India and Nigeria. The goal in 1985 was to completely eliminate polio from the world by Rotary's 100th anniversary in 2005; however, it is two years past the goal date, but the end is in sight.
