1.0 SUMMARY

The 1982 Shrimporee and Benefit Auction was held at Galveston County Park at League City on Saturday September 18. (Backup date was Oct 2). The weather was clear and hot. Very hot. Fried fish, boiled shrimp, cole slaw and beans were served with the meal ticket. Cakes, cookies, soft drinks, beer, wine and ice cream were sold a-la-carte.

For the first time we used (1) self service food lines which were (2) outside of the cook shed (3) with no refills. A Rotarian collected food tickets at the head of each line. This arrangement provided an accurate count of plates served:

Adults 2180

Children 337 (including scouts from HCYV)

Total 2517

This was not the largest turn out but profits from the auction were the largest ever and the net profits from all activities was the second largest of the nine events held to date. Over \$18,000 was turned over to the Treasurer as net profit.

An additional \$1300 of profit was spent on "new" items: 2 used fish fryers for \$750, a liability insurance policy for \$192 and a storage shed rented for one year (until September 23, 1983) for \$360. In subsequent sections these items will be discussed in more detail.

The principle beneficiary of this years proceeds was "Meals on Wheels" In November, a check for \$5,000.00 was presented to them.

All of the committee chairmen did an excellent job and their final reports are presented in subsequent sections of this report.

2.0 CORRESPONDENCE AND SCHEDULES

A copy of my correspondence and schedules in attached as an appendix to this report.

This park should be reserved on the first working day in January by calling the Parks Board at 762-8621, X-412 and ask for Linda. That is a Galveston number. You can also reach that extention by a local call to the North Annex: 337-2575, or 534-2531.

3.0 FOOD COST ANALYSIS

Since this year we allowed only one serving per ticket and collected tickets at the head of the food line, we know exactly (for the first time) how many people were served. We can divide this number into the cost of each item and determine the per person cost of that item.

The results are shown below. It may be seen that shrimp was the most expensive item, costing us \$4.36 per serving and beans were the cheapest at 0.10 per person served.

The total direct expense of the food service was \$6.62 per person. If we calculate the income from only the tickets used and subtract the total food cost from the ticket income, we show a net profit of \$254. If we charge food service with the cost of the tickets we show a small net loss.

Why then do we show a food service profit of over \$3,000 in the treasurers report? The profit comes from tickets sold but not used.

The data comes from the reports of the treasurer, Aaron Schein and the ticket sales chairman, Bob Mitchell. If you examine these reports you will find that we really cut down in costs this year in the ticket and food service expenses. Even so we only broke even on food. No profit. The cost and consumption of shrimp was a big factor.

4.0 OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

4.1 Clean up: Every year we schedule members for cleanup and every year only one out of three are there when we need them. Too much beer is one of the reasons. Those who are left to clean up are usually committee chairmen who are so tired they can hardly walk. This year, in the food shed, the Shrimp Committee cleaned up their end. Everyone else left their mess and unused supplies and went home. We were able to pusuade the Boy Scouts to sweep and hose down but it was still marginal. Eagle Stores had the food pavillion reserved for the next day (Sunday). They came in at 7:00 a.m. and again swept and hosed down. We didn't lose our deposit but it was close.

Many members believe the site prep and parking committee are responsible for all clean-up. We doubled the size of that committee this year. At 7:00 a.m. only the chairman was there. In short this assumption doesn't work. The only system that has ever worked is that each committee clean up it's own area. I did not emphasize that point in 1982 and it was a mistake.

The same thing happened on Logistics. At 7:00 p.m. only 2 people on that committee were left. No one was there to help load the vans with the unused supplies, fish thawing racks, the dirty utensils, and the 101 item to go back to storage. We had to leave all of the Rotary chairs and all the food service lumber. The lumber was stolen over night. (the food service committee did disassemble the food service rain cover and clean up that area).

The logistics committee is responsible for transporting the equipment to be stored to the shed and unloading it. They also must return all of the utensils and equipment borrowed from the school district. This process doesn't start until about an hour after food service ends — that means 7:00 p.m. It is unrealistic to expect 2 people who have been working since 6 a.m. to assemble everyone's leftover supplies and equipment and then do their assigned task. Furthermore, cleanup can't start until all of the supplies are out of the cook shack.

In summary, getting their left-over equipment to the logistics van and cleaning up their area is the responsibility of each committee and arrangements for doing this must be the responsibility of each committee chairman.

The shrimp prep committee does this task very well. So does the cake/cookie committee and drink committee and the drink committee (however, only the chairman was left to store the soft drink trailer). Next year it should be planned function of every committee.

4.2 Access to the Reserved Parking Area: Due to a misunderstanding there was no control to parking around the food service area until after 11:00 a.m. Then it was too late. Most workers were too busy to move their cars.

In 1983, access control should start by 7:30 a.m. In the morning Rotary Members who need to unload equipment should be allowed to enter the area long enough to do so but then move their car out to the road. After noon, only those with parking passes are allowed into the area (and handicapped into special areas). This control is needed.

- 4.3 Controlling the Rate of Fish Cooking: I have been told that four and five years ago we could start at 10:00 a.m. cooking fish as fast as possible and still almost run out of cooked fish by 3:00 p.m. The records support this statement, but also point out that only four (4) fish fryers were used at any one time due to power limitations. However we fixed the power limitations and for the past 3 years the reverse has happened. Before food service starts, the oven is half full and by mid-afternoon that oven is completely full and cooked fish is being stored in the second oven. By the time it is served, it tastes like smoked rubber. There has to be a better way to control the cooking rate of fish so that supply equals demand. Maybe going back to four cookers should be considered.
- 4.4 Shrimp Serving: This year we tried a self service food line. It worked fine except with shrimp. Too many people abused the privilege by piling the plate with shrimp. (We can quantify this observation. We bought 2400 pounds of headed shrimp and served 2517 people. Some people did not get shrimp because we ran out at 5:15 p.m. Even so, the average consumption was about a pound per person. Cost of shrimp was \$10,885., that works out to\$4.32 per person served). If we continue self service in 1983, we can prevent this abuse by having a Rotarian serve the shrimp. I would suggest a water tumbler or serving cup for uniformity.
- 4.5 Signs: After the Auction and Shrimporee most of the signs are stored in the storage shed and forgotten until a week before (or the day of) the next Shrimporee. Then we discover they are faded, lost, or broken. Next year I suggest we appoint one person to start preparing all the signs a month or two before the Shrimporee/Auction. For example:

Large sign in front of park - Larry Rowe stores this one Sign for ticket sales - Bill Webb has it 2 signs for cars to be auctioned - Bill Webb Food Service Signs Drink Signs Cake and cookie Signs Condiment Signs

- 4.6 Car roof racks for signs: We have only one roof rack that Joe Shirley donated. It did not fit either car this year but it may fit one next year. This year Bill Webb loaned us his rack for one car and built a wooden rack for the other car. If we plan to auction cars in 1983, preparation for mounting signs on the roof of the cars should be made before the cars are donated.
- 4.7 Motor Scooters: For several years now we have auctioned motor scooters on consignment. The profit spread between the consignment price and the sales price has been negligible (consistantly). Consideration should be given to discontinuing this item.
- 4.8 Fish Frying Oil: This year it cost us \$413 for peanut oil to fry fish.

 We threw away good oil because it was filled with bread crumbs. Next
 year we should buy strainers which fit over a bucket and strain the oil.

 A plan and equipment for doing this should be developed before hand.
- Borrowing Equipment from C.C.I.S.D.: After 9 years we may have worn out our welcome at C.C.I.S.D. Most of the equipment we borrow each year can be bought; some disposable, some reusable. The 1982 Logistics committee has some good recommendations in their report on this subject. In 1982 (as in prior years) we paid employees at C.C.I.S.D. to work on Sunday and wash our dirty utensils. (The Logistics chairman delivers the utensils at 9:00 a.m. on Sunday and delivers a check to them after Rotary on Monday. If you want to use their utensils, you play the game by their rules)! If we buy our own utensils, who will wash them? when? Also the two big racks for trays for fish thawing is also a problem here. Needs our attention.
- 4.10 <u>Garbage Dumpsters</u>: The one free dumpster from DisposeAll was a disaster (see site prep report). If we can do it, I recommend dealing with another source or buy a service. Try Bob Drenth at Best Waste Systems (337-2513). They gave excellent service in past years.
- 4.11 Fish and Shrimp Procurement: These were two committees in 1982. Previously they had been 2 functions under one committee. I recommend we return to one committee. Storage of the frozen fish and frozen shrimp have become a significant problem. It should be addressed early in 1983 and a plan developed.
- 4.12 Ice Cream: This year we sold ice cream a-la-carte. It went well with the kids. No big profit maker at 12.5 cents profit per item. However, after the event we had to store the freezer and unsold ice cream until it could be picked up on Monday. We lost most of our ice cream and profit to thieves on Saturday night after we locked up. Unless we can prevent this condition in 1983, I suggest we discontinue ice-cream.

- Accident Liability Insurance: We bought a one-day personal liability policy for just under \$200. It does not cover Rotarians, product liability (e.g. food poisoning) or liquor liability (e.g. accidents due to excessive drinking) Graydon Strictland (Hall's insurance) handled the policy. This is the first year we have purchased any insurance. We could spend \$500 on insurance if we wanted to. I'm not sure it is worth it. I suggest we ask one of the Rotary Members of the legal profession to research it and make recommendations. As a non-profit corporation are we, as Rotary members, liable beyond the net worth of the corporation? What is that net worth? Should we continue some insurance for "good will"? If you want it, Aaren Schein has the copy of this year's policy.
- Rented Storage Shed: For years we have stored our equipment in Ken Kaye's shed. Each year the stock grew in size. In 1978 we acquired 200 chairs from the C.C.I.S.D. which we have stored year round in Billy Wiseman's storage shed. Each year both Billy and Ken suggest we might like to find another place to store our equipment after the Shrimporee. In my opinion we have imposed on them too long. So this year, after the Shrimporee I located a dry and relatively inexpensive storage shed and we moved everything into it. It is located west of the Baybrook Mall at 2015 Bay Area Blvd. A copy of the lease agreement is attached. The rent is paid until September 23, 1983. However, the last month's rent is also the deposit.
- Fish Fryers: Just prior to the Shrimporee and Auction, I requested and received Board approval to purchase two used fish fryers for \$750.00. Al Jawid made the arrangements and picked up the fryers. At the Shrimporee only one of them worked, so Al returned them for warranty repair and then delivered them to Jim Wyatt (H.L.& P) for check-out. In November, Jim stored all of the fryers(now 8) and the transformer board in our storage shed on Bay Area. A copy of the sales invoice is attached.

5.0 CONCLUSION

I appreciate the hard work put in by many members and their wives. I was fortunate in having many excellent committee chairmen and excellent (if you like it hot) weather. I have stored this event in my memory along with the memory of my two years in the U.S. Marine Corp.

Note: Cecil Palmer, a Space Center Rotarian and U.S. Weather Bureau Chief, was asked to notify the Television Weatherman "personalities" in Houston to "plug" the Shrimporee.

MEWS COVERAGE:

Our sincerest thanks to the staff of the Lake Publishing Company (Daily Citizen and The Exchange News) and especially Ms. Sarah Hickey for an outstanding job of placing the prepared news releases in their company-owned newspapers as well as covering all aspects of the Shrimporee.

SUPPLEMENT:

I had suggested, at the initial meeting of our Committee that a special "supplement" be prepared to be released the week of the Shrimporee. The 1st supplement (we expect this to be an annual part of the publicity program for Shrimporee) was issued with The Exchange News on Thursday September 16th. The supplement was advertiser-supported... covered 8 pages and included articles on Rotary goals (by C. Jacobsen) as well as Shrimporee information and news.

DISCOUNT COUPONS:



Rotarians predict Shrimporee net as the best ever

A record may have been broken by the Space Center Rotarians at its Ninth Annual Space Center Rotary Club Shrimporee and Auction on Saturday. Rotarians raised an estimated gross total of \$44,000 at this annual benefit at Galveston County Park.

Not yet determined is the net total to be disclosed next week after all the ticket sales have been tallied and the bills for food, beverages, and other miscellaneous costs have been paid.

Every year for the past nine years the Space Center Rotary club has held this fund-raising event to benefit a local charity organization and to accumulate scholarship funds for deserving youths.

This year's primary beneficiary of the auction is the recently-established Bay Area Meals on Wheels, an ganization that provides hot, nutritious meals to hancapped home-bound persons throughout the Bay Area.

The net total from the auction yielded \$17,000 and \$900 was raised from the bake sale. Last year's auction netted \$14,000. Auction money is used exclusively for charities and donations. All items auctioned were donated by local businesses and individuals. According to the Rotarians, the money raised from the ticket sales usually breaks even with the cost of the food for the event.

"We are deeply indebted to Jim Fonteno for lending his services," said Rotarian Bill Webb. Fonteno, Harris County Commissioner, donated his auctioning skills to the charity auction. Bob Soltys, publicity chairman of this fund raising event, said that Fonteno is one of the best auctioneers in the county.

"There is a possibility that we set a record over our 1979 total of \$22,500 net," said Chuck Jacobson, president of the Space Center Rotary.

Factors contributing to its success are the good weather and proper scheduling. At last year's Shrimporee, a cold front accompanied by rain blew in resulting in poor turn-

- 1. Tickets were patterned after last year's tickets, but were not numbered. Approximately 7000 adult and 4000childtickets were printed. This was about 2000 too many adults and about 1500 too many child's tickets. Bids were taken from three club members who have printing businesses and Joe Hang was the low bidder. As I recall the tickets cost about \$200 which was about \$300 less than the year before. A copy of the tickets is attached.
- 2. I counted out the tickets into packages of 30 adults and 10 child's and handed the packages out at the regular club meetings. The first packe were handed out about six weeks before the Shrimporee. Five packets had to be mailed because the members didn't show up at the meetings.
- 3. Some difficulty was experienced in getting the packets out to the banks. Finally Gene Lindquist made the distribution to nine area banks. A list of the banks and the contacts is attached.
- 4. Money from ticket sales was collected at each Monday club meeting. One man is needed for this task. After collecting, the money was given to the treasurer. Some members gave their money directly to the treasurer, others gave it to other members and as a consequence it was not always possible to tell who had turned in their money and who hadn't. I don't see any way to avoid this situation in the future unless one were to be more strict with the members than I think we ought to be in a service club, where we assume everyone is honest. I suggest we just live with the situation and do the best we can. Returns from the tickets were \$1230 the first week, \$576 the second week, \$820 the third week and \$2478 on the forth week. These figures are included to help the treasurer estimate cash flow next year.

5. On the day of the Shrimporee ticket sales were begun about 11:30 at a table set up at the entrance near the serving lines. Two people are needed to man the table, and a third is needed at times to get change and beer etc. Two shifts were run, one from 11:00 to 2:30 and the other from 2:30 to 6:00 when the serving ended. The treasurer came by several times to pick up extra money. Near the end of the serving period when the shrimp ran out we reduced the price to half and let people look over the food before they bought a ticket. During the last 15 or 20 minutes of serving, after 6:00, we refused to sell any more tickets and the remaining food was given away.

RESULTS

The following figures are only approximate since some funds were turned in directly to the treasurer. His records should be considered the authority.

Total ticket sales	\$20,288
Gate sales	2,712
Bank sales	1,966
Members sales	15,610

My records show that Gene Lindquist sold tickets worth \$2,299, but I think that he sold more than this.

OBSERVATIONS AND RECOMMENDATIONS

- 1. We did not use ticket teams and team leaders this year. I don't think it had an adverse effect on sales or on collections. And didn't effect the timeliness of the ticket distribution.
- 2. Only one person is needed to handle bank sales, but the job must be done "in the day and probably takes about 10-12 hours to make the distribution and collection. The effort seems worth it though. We considered selling tickets at other business locations, but didn't think it worthwhile.
- 3. The coupons sent out as bank stuffers and those printed in the Exchange were helpful. We collected 51 bank coupons and 25 cut from the paper. I think the effect of the coupon was to be a reminder to a number of people of the Shrimporee. I recommend that the coupons be used again next year.
- 4. Some trouble was experienced in getting a few members to turn in their ticket money. Chuck Jacobson made a number of calls to members to remind them. This was much appreciated. Some of the trouble came from the practice of some members giving tickets and money to other members to turn in or by sharing tickets with one another because one member had run out. After a little of this, there was no way to keep track of things. I don't have any recommendation on how to correct this, and since it occurs only among a few I'd accept it a as a part of the job.

5. Gene Lindquist is to be coomplimented for his ticket sales and for helping out in the bank sales. I would have have been hard put to get the tickets out without Gene's help. Joe Hang was very helpful in printing the tickets (doing the layout for free) and manning the sales table and in collecting, as were Dave Sincox and Maury Fitch.

Site Preparation And Cleanup Committe

- 1. COOKERS As in years past, Jim Wyatt did an outstanding job in this regard. He delivered, hooked up and cleaned the cookers. There has been some discussion as to who should actually clean the cookers this committee or the fish cooking committee. I feel it would be a great help if the fish preparation committee would take charge of this permanently as one of their duties to clarify the issue. The shrimp committee does an excellent job of cleaning not only their equipment but also their area in the cook shed. The fish committee should be able to do this also.
- 2. LIGHTING AND ELECTRICAL Once again, Billy Weseman and his company took charge and did a fantastic job. In addition Billy assisted our committee in loading and delivering the Rotary chairs stored in his warehouse. At the conclusion of the Shrimporee there was some confusion in returning the chairs since our scouts had to leave before the chairs could be returned but Billy took care of this.
- 3. BOY SCOUTS I wonder how we would manage the Shrimporee with out the assistance of Chris Christman and his scout troop from the Harris County Youth Village. I don't think one can truly appreciate their efforts without serving on this committee. Hauling tables and chairs, parking cars and picking up trash is not the most enjoyable job at the Shrimporee, but Chris and his scouts are there every year, hot or cold, rain or shine, working their posteriors off for us.
- 4. LAW ENFORCEMENT It was suggested that due to various problems with County patrolmen at last year's Shrimporee that we change procedure this year and hire one city policeman and obtain the services of one on-duty policeman for traffic control, thereby having to pay for only one officer. As it turned out, League City requires that any organization or function serving alcoholic beverages hire two off-duty policemen to work from 1:00 pm. to 8:00 pm. These officers did a good job with no problems and I would suggest that we use League City again next year.
- 5. DUMPSTERS This was the biggest headache of all for this committee. Last year, the Dispose-All company donated the use of four small dumpsters. Mr. Ed Rosinski, the company president preferred this year to donate one large dumpster. This was to be delivered on Friday afternoon or Saturday morning. At 11:00 am. Saturday the dumpster finally arrived after numerous telephone calls. Shortly thereafter, a second large dumpster arrived and was turned away. The real problem arose when we could not get the dumpster picked up. It sat full of fish, shrimp, roaches, rats, etc. for almost a week, obviously, the parks personnel were less than thrilled with this. I would suggest that we obtain our dumpsters from a different source next year, if at all possible.

- of table and chairs from the Ed White Youth Center in Seabrook. However, it seems that the Center was omitted from our list of beneficiaries following the 1981 Shrimporee and that fact did not please the trustees at the Center. Therefore, they decided to deny us use of their tables and chairs this year. That forced us to rent them which maybe was a blessing in disguise. For the sum of \$360.00 we rented twenty tables and 300 chairs complete with delivery and pick-up from United Rent-All who also supplied us at the last minute, with a platform for the band. I would suggest that we continue to rent table and chairs in the future. This eliminates many manhours of loading and unloading.
- 7. PA SYSTEM Again this year, Pete Gist allowed us to use his system.
- 8. AUCTION FLATBED As in the past, this item was handled completely by Don Kirk.
- STAFFING The manpower assignments were scheduled in two-hour 9. shifts from 8:00 am until 8:00 pm. Each shift consisted of two men whose functions were to supervise the restricted and unconstricted parking areas. At the final meeting of the Shrimporee Committee, Jack Eggleston suggested that we allow free access to the cook shed area until 10:30 at which time all vehicles with special parking permits should be moved to the streets adjacent to the site. Apparently, there was a failure of communication between Jack and myself because I took this to mean that we were eliminating parking control on the morning shifts and cancelled the first three hours of manpower. When 10:30 arrived very few people moved their cars since by that time they were covered in cornmeal, cooking fish, ets. No major problem was cause by the excess number of cars in the area but it was an inconvenience and should be avoided next year.

The general public parking was handled, almost without incident, by Chris Christman, his scout troop and the League City policemen. It should be noted that Jim Wyatt provided us with a rope to cordon off the reserved parking areas.

10. CLEANUP - This is an area that could use more coordination. As mentioned before the Shrimp Committee did an excellent job of cleaning their small portion of the cook shed. The other food preparation committees did a good job of securing their equipment but the shed in general was left in a mess. Once again, thanks to four or five dedicated, hard working Boy Scouts, we were able to wash down and mop up the shed before the Scouts had to leave. Additionally, the entire scout troop patrolled the park area all day picking up loose trash and emptying trash bags in the dumpster.

The logistics committe should have most cleaning supplies for next year such as mops, brooms, sponges, etc. We purchased 300 plastic trash bags and had many left over. I think the extras ended up at the youth village but that is a small price to pay for the manhours we received.

I would suggest in the future that each committee have its own cleanup team that comes in "fresh" about 5:00 pm to start cleaning. If each committee could clean up after itself, the general cleanup committee would have more time to finish securing the site.

1982 ROTARY SHRIMPOREE SHRIMP PROCUREMENT COMMITEE REPORT Jim McNatt - Chairman

The key to "easily" having shrimp available in the quantity we require is making arrangements for it starting no later than April or May for a September shrimporee. I enquoted the word easily because even starting that early for this year's '82 fund raiser almost didn't get us enough shrimp. The nature of the shrimping season is too unpredictable to start any later.

Another thing that saved us this year was actually buying shrimp early and storing it ourselves. It not only guaranteed that we would have the shrimp, but it also got us the most favorable price. This year I dealt with an independent supplier who contracted verbally to buy 3,000 lbs. of shrimp, freeze, and store it. He did this at a fixed price per pound (\$3.50) and guaranteed us 2,300 lbs. of tails. His name is Gene Fisher, and he can be contacted at the Lake Haven Marina through the number at the restaurant, 334-1304. His friend there is Frank Jones.

Since it was such a difficult year to obtain shrimp, I don't know if Gene will want to do this for us again next year or not, or if he does, whether he will want to store them himself. He mentioned our using the Houston terminal warehouse possibly next year for storage, which may be necessary whether we use Gene or one of the fish houses like Emory's or Henry's. I would suggest calling Henry's at 474-2333 to inquire about buying from them again next year as well.

Buying ahead like we did this year also requires borrowing some money. Jim Hargrove at Allied Seabrook supplied the note and worked with our shrimporee treasurer Aaron Schein at Baybrook National to organize this.

Once the shrimp have been brought, frozen, and stored, the next thing to organize is the day of the shrimporee itself, how to get the shrimp there, in what quantities and when.

Even though the shrimp workers like to start cooking thawed shrimp at 9:00 A.M., and will probably continue to want to do it this way, we discovered that a 10:30 or even 11:00 A.M. start is sufficient. 2,400 lbs. of shrimp were supplied in both thawed and frozen states. Since Gene was not very organized about the deliveries, I suggest if we use him again that more attention be paid next year as to exactly when and how much shrimp we want. We may have to be prepared to take care of this part ouselves.

There were no left-over shrimp, either cooked or not, so we did not have to deal with this possibility again this year. Since we already paid for the shrimp, the plan this year was to sell or auction it off, which I think is still a workable solution.

One addition to the serving process which I think was very good this year was the use of larger coolers to drain the shrimp instead of placing them back in the dirty wooden crates that the thawed shrimp were supplied in. The styrofoam containers for the actual food serving were also a great improvement.

To summarize, start early, make contact with the suppliers and bankers, and then organize for the storage and delivery. Also, be prepared to have to change some plans in mid-shrimping season. It has happened to me for the last two years in a row. Therefore, maintain contact with the suppliers throughout the season from the start of the agreements made up to the delivery phase. Then, just hope the shrimp season is a good one.

Re: Final Report - Fish Procurement Committee

This report is being submitted on behalf of Keith Sherman, who served as chairman of the committee for this year.

Fish for the Shrimboree was again obtained through Magnolia Seafood (224-7505) at a negotiated price of \$2.12 per pound for the Islandic Jumbo Cod Filets, up from \$1.94 per pound in 1981. Magnolia was most cooperative, but was unable to supply any type of refrigerated truck in which to maintain the fish over the weekend of the event. Magnolia did agree to repurchase all of the cartons that remained frozen and unopened.

Since arrangements for the storage of the shrimm would not accommodate the fish, we were fortunate to make arrangements with Camp Manison, Highway 518, for storage from delivery early Friday through pickup of the returned on Wednesday. As a back up storage facility, we were offered space at Southwest Biological Storage (482-3309) operated by Mr. Jim Wood, a Pearland Rotarian.

Since it appears that only a few firms in the area are capable of supplying the quantity and quality of fish desired, it is our recommendation that the fish and shrimp procurement committees be combined, which should assist in coordinating the storage of the products which was the major problem faced by our committee. It is also recommended that negotiations for the purchase of the fish be initiated several months before the event to possibly obtain a more favorable price.

Special thanks to Mr. & Mrs. Manison for the use of their storage facilities as well as the time in receiving and monitoring the pick up of the fish, and to Joe Blackshear who stepped in and did an outstanding job of assisting the committee as well as the transfer of the fish and shrimp on the day of the Shrimporee.

2,200 pounds of fish were ordered, 1700 pounds were used and 500 pounds returned for credit. All billings were handed by Magnolia Seafood direct with the club as arranged by Keith Sherman.

Cooking Recipe:

For years we have had a baseline recipe supplied by Breezy from the Brazoriaport Club when they first got our club started on the Shrimporee. For the last two years we have been running our own experiments to improve on our technique and hopefully the flavor and consistency from batch to batch.

The original recipe from Breezy as handed down through various chairmen is:

4 lbs. lemmon/onion mix/100 lbs of shrimp 3 parts onion to 2 parts lemmon by weight finely blended (UHCLC blenders)

9 oz. shrimp boil for each 100 lbs of shrimp 3/4 lbs of salt for each 100 lbs of shrimp

During the last two years we have experimented with the ingredients by making small changes and getting a concensus of opinions from willing tasters among the Rotarians. After cooking twenty batches between last year and this year we have arrived at what seems to be a good procedure and recipe. It is based on changing the water and seasoning completely after each 1,000 lbs. of shrimp. That can be stretched to 1,500 lbs. if we were in a schedule bind but preferably we should change out the soup each 1,000 lbs. We have also switched to dehydrauted onion flakes and can't tell the difference, but have eliminated the eye watering task of blending raw onions.

The recommended recipe is as follows:

Water - Fill cooker 4" from top - 100 gallons Onion Flakes - 24 cups Lemmon - 36 cups Salt - 16 cups Boil - 15 cups - 120 oz.

It is not necessary or desirable to add ingrediants between batches. It is okay to add a proportionate amount of ingredients in the event that the ice condition of the shrimp causes a significant amount of water to be drained off - This will not be necessary for 1,000 lbs. at 200 lbs/load if the shrimp has been iced properly and the ice on top can be scraped off.

Operating Procedure

Early

Assemble committee to a) establish shifts, b) obtain volunteers to bring supply items, c) volunteers to purchase various items, d) get two or three members on lemmon blending committee, e) inspect boiler, determine if sandblasting and painting are needed and take appropriate action.

Day Before

In concert with cole slaw committee, prepare the lemmons. This activity is coordinated as to time with cole slaw committee so that we only use the UHCLC kitchen equipment during one span of time. This normally will occur about 3:30 p.m. on Friday afternoon before the Shrimporee.

Shrimporee Day

7:30 a.m. - 1 st shift meet at park, clean area and proceed to storage warehouse to pick up equipment and supplies, clean the cooker, hook up propane, fill the cooker and have fire on by about 9:00 a.m.

Cook 200 - 250 lbs. per batch, water boiling before adding shrimp. Limit the ice going in as far as practical.

Remove shrimp quickly when shells loosen (they float) "DON'T DELAY" or they will be overcooked.

Change water every 1,000 lbs. of shrimp, this takes almost an hour to accomplish.

When the Shrimporee General Chairman says we're finished the crew cleans up, loads up, and hauls everything back to storage. An inventory should be made of supplies left over for the use by next years committee.

Problems and Recommendations

Our asbestos heat shield has warped and broken and we should plan to replace it - cost about \$30.00.

Shrimp delivery must be more punctual, we were in a stew because delivery was slow - we can better aid the contractor if necessary with transportation and labor.

Much of the shrimp was delivered in 5 lbs. frozen boxes - "We Must Not Do That" - we must insist that shrimp be delivered in bulk quantities. The cooking quality is hurt by this because the inside and outside of the frozen blocks cook at different rates and the excess of ice causes us to drain off soup from the cooker and therefore changes the recipe. We also don't have a crew big enough to handle the extra work at a reasonable level of effort.

The committee is going to look at the feasibility of moving the shrimp cooking out of the cookshed and away from the smoke. We must solve the cooker drain problem and provide overheat shade. We will, of course, coordinate any such major change with the General Chairman before implementing any changes to our established routine.

1982 SHRIMPOREE BEANS COMMITTEE REPORT SEPTEMBER 18, 1982

Supplies:

The supplies required are shown in enclosure 1. The beans were procured. The spoons were borrowed from Clear Creek Independent School District. The propane torch and the can opener came from storage. The soft aluminum throwaway pans (new this year) and the hot pads were purchased. The dish towels and aprons were provided by Bill Tuite. All items were supplied by Alan Wylie and his Logistics Committee

Last year 270 cans of beans were purchased and 131 were consumed. Unused beans were returned. This year we again ordered 270 cans, six cans per case. A change in serving procedure to "serve yourself" buffet lines with no refills tended to result in customers loading their plates with fish and shrimp. Therefore, bean consumption was down. This was no loss, however, since we can return unopened cases for a full refund. Thirty cases were returned which means we paid for 15 cases (90 cans). Four cans from an opened case were given to the Boys Home. This year's consumption of 86 cans is down 34% from last year. A recap of consumption, including statistics for prior years, follows:

Procedures:

The work tasks, shifts, and workers are shown in enclosure 3. The preparation procedures were essentially the same as the last several years:

- o Use preseasoned Ranch Style beans.
- o Use the large barbeque pit.
- O Start fires in the pit approximately 2 hours before serving starts.
- o Heat the beans in opened cans in West end of pit.
- o Transfer to trays and send directly to serving areas or maintain heat by placing trays in East end of pit.

Comments:

All but one rotarian assigned to the Beans Committee, see enclosure 3, made it on Shrimporee day and worked hard. The firewood was dry and well seasoned this year and started very easily and quickly. The Club might consider purchasing and donating to Gaiveston County permanently installed ceiling exhaust fans to carry the smoke out of the cook shed. This would be of great benefit to all workers in the shed, as the smoke gets rather thick at times. However, if the location of the Shrimporee is changed, this suggestion obviously should be ignored.

The use of soft aluminum throwaway pans was initiated this year. As far as the Beans Committee is concerned, this change from hard aluminum reusable pans worked fine. We used a few more pans, approximately 10, due to a weight limitation with the weaker pans. We loaded each pan with two cans of beans versus the four cans we could put in the stronger reusable pans. But, since consumption was down, we still had no trouble with oven space for warming.



1982 Fish Frying Committee Ron Neighbors, Chairman

The major difference in the 1982 Shrimporee--Fish Frying effort was caused by an adjustment in the serving procedures. While it is not my intent to evaluate the change, it did allow people (customers) to take an abundance of shrimp and "forego" the fish. Now we all know that the fish is the best product that we put out and is superior to the shrimp. However, public appeal for shrimp is greater and given a choice, we know what they will choose. After all it is called a Shrimporee not a Fishoree.

As in prior years, we started frying early to be able to get the fish prepared before the noon rush. This year we over cooked. This is wasteful and also produces an unsatisfactory product. The quality of the fish decreases the minute that we put the fish in the smokers. When the fish stays in the smokers for any length of time, it becomes rubbery and becomes less tasteful.

The necessity to store frozen fish some distance away from the cooking site also poses a problem in that you have to commit very early as to how much fish enters the "no return" process.

Recommendations are as follows:

- 1) If there are to be changes in the serving process that affects the amount of fish required, then we must regulate the fish frying effort.
- 2) We should provide enough fish fryers to support the needs of fried fish on a basis that does not require the use of smokers.
- 3) We should consider any improvement in the frying process--that is the fryers are getting old and either need to be replaced

added to in like kind or some other vat process or better method.

- 4) If a truck were available to store the frozen fish, it would minimize the amount of fish that would be wasted.
- 5) We must provide a clean-up crew to help with the messy clean-up and the loading of equipment. By the end of the day, the Fish Frying Committee members are exhausted.

In summary, we had great support from all other Committees, an improved electrical hook-up system, but we fried too much fish and did not have enough customers.

Attached is a list of equipment and supplies for 1982, and a list of Rotarians on the Committee. There were also numerous volunteers without whose help we would not have made the day.

The Red Sauce Committee operations for the 1982 Shrimporee went smoothly and without any significant problems. This was primarily due to the following:

- 5. Volunteer workers solicited by Chuck Jacobson.
- 6. Serving support by those volunteer workers (see Encl. 1).

We prepared approximately 60 gallons of the red sauce and served 11 gallons of ketchup only. This was slightly more than half of the quantities ordered. Earlier in the year you and I had discussed the number of people to be served and we agreed on 5,000. Based on your estimate of 2,800 through the gate, the amount prepared was about on target. According to our calculations, we prepared 3,760 oz. (60 gallons) of red sauce and served an additional 1,408 oz. (11 gallons) of ketchup. Based on actual costs, we served the red sauce for 7¢ per 2 oz. cup.

Operations Layout

We set up the serving tables as recommended by the 1981 Final Report. The layout was as shown in the diagram on Encl. 2. I strongly recommend that it be used in future Shrimporees because the flow of traffic was very smooth with a minimum of waiting. We could have served twice as many with no strain. Regardless of next year's location for the Shrimporee, the condiment serving tables should be in immediate proximity to the end of the food serving lines. The next year's Condiment Chairman should re-evaluate the situation in close consultation with the Food Committee's final decision as to where the food serving lines are to be stationed.

While the flow of traffic was aided by use of a 'Red Sauce' sign in front of the red sauce tables and another sign in front of the bread/napkin/fork table (diagram on Encl. 1), some people seemingly cannot read so everything must be under their noses; hence the need for proximity of both tables to the food serving exit area.

Serving

We were always well staffed at the serving tables and possibly could manage with a total of 3 servers per shift instead of the 4 per shift we had available. If the day is a hot one, I recommend sticking to 4 per shift. The 2 oz. cups were used exclusively and that allowed the server to fill enough cups in advance so that there was never a wait to be served. Servers were given the option to use the ice cream scoops or the 1 quart size pouring flasks; the scoops were preferred over the plastic pouring flasks. A new "Ketchup Only" sign was located at the end of one table and that location proved to be sufficient for all needs.

Although we did not have a planned sale of red sauce, we packed up the remainder (about 15 quarts) and brought it to Rotary Club the following Monday and sold it for \$1.00 per quart. Because of the interest of Rotarians in wanting to buy some, I recommend that next year all remaining ingredients (broken cases of ketchup, chili sauce, horseradish, etc.) be used to make up extra red sauce for sale at Rotary the next Monday. The empty quart horseradish jars are ideal for this purpose. With actual costs at 7¢ per 2 oz., each quart (32 oz.) should be sold for \$1.50.

General Operations

The previous year's report (an extract of the general plan I wrote in 1980) details the plans and operations sufficiently. I am attaching it, modified slightly, as Encl. 3 to this report rather than rewrite it. This enclosure, supplemented by the information in the previous paragraph of this report, provides an adequate planning guide. We had only two Rotarians working (Steadman and Hall); Will Owens had an illness in the family. While 2 would be sufficient, they must be 100% committed to the Condiment Committee routine. Unfortunately, George Hall had been tapped to serve a shift on the food serving line, which placed a real burden on the 1 remaining person. This should be

avoided in 1983. Schedules and assignments are indicated on Encl. 4.

If we stay at Galveston County Park in 1983, I recommend that the cole slaw group be located closer to the serving window and condiments be positioned closer to the door. We were reversed from that this year and were constantly crossing each other's operation.

Expenditures

The Logistics Committee procured all consumables. I have already been reimbursed for lumber, poster board, miscellaneous hardware, etc. that I used in making the new signs.

Returned to Storage

The following items and amounts of non-perishables were returned to Alan Wylie and inventoried for next year's operation:

2 oz. paper cups	6,100
Large napkins	15,000
Large plastic forks	4,000
Salt & pepper packets	1,000 ea.
Silver conduit tape	1/2 roll
7' standard with sign on base "Red Sauce"	1

The above reserve of non-perishables should be taken into consideration in ordering for 1983.

Equipment Retained

The only equipment that I retained that belongs to Rotary is detailed below. When next year's Condiment Chairman has been selected, I will turn these over to him:

- 1 Super Duper mixer (stainless steel, 1/2 shaft with blades attached.
- 4 Plastic buckets, 3 gallon capacity. (These are in poor shape and should be replaced.)
- 5 Ice cream scoops for pouring sauce into the 2 cz. cups:

- 1 Heavy duty can opener
- 4 quart-size plastic pouring flasks with spouts for filling the 2 oz. cups.

Recommendations

- 1. That George Hall be the Condiment Committee Chairman for 1983.
- 2. That the red sauce operations layout for 1982, as shown on the diagram, be used in future Shrimporees.
- 3. That the quantities of raw materials ordered be significantly reduced. For a 1982-type crowd, I recommend the following quantities:

Ketchup: 10 cases of 6 1-gallon cans	60 Gal.
Chili Sauce: 2 cases of 6 1-gallon cans	12 Gal.
Horseradish: 2 cases of 12 1-quart jars	6 Gal.
Worcestershire Sauce: 2 1-gallon jugs	2 Gal.
Lemon Concentrate: 2 1-gallon jugs	2 Gal.

Tabasco: 3 boxes of 24 2-oz. bottles

Bread: 90 loaves

2 oz. Paper Cups 6,000

Napkins: 10,000 Forks: 6,000

4. The Condiment Chairman and the General Chairman should agree on the best estimate of servings to be made and supplies should be ordered according to that number.



1982 BEVERAGE COMMITTEE REPORT

GENERAL. I would like to take the opportunity at the beginning of this report to recognize and thank those fellow committeemen who contributed invaluable guidance and hard work. Alphabetically they are: Pete Gist, Al Jowid, Carlos Villagomez and Walt Wicker. In addition, a list of all those that worked on the committee, both Rotarian and volunteer, is attached.

SECTION I - BEER

CHAIRMAN: CARLOS VILLAGOMEZ

PROCUREMENT. Bids for the beer concession were requested from Del Papa Distributor (Budweiser), Coors and Schlitz. The representatives were Budweiser (Galveston), Mr. Brad Wolfe, telephone number: Office 1-740-3505; Coors (Houston), Mr. Randy Boston, telephone number: Office 1-799-9910, Home 669-1544; and Schlitz (Galveston), Mr. Hal Gregory, telephone number 762-9619.

The concession was awarded to Budweiser based on lowest bid, \$26 per keg for Budweiser and \$21 per keg for Budweiser Light for 20 mixed kegs and over. The Coors price was a fixed \$31 per keg. Schlitz did not respond to the beer request but did propose the wine coolers (See Section 3).

Five individual Rotarians contributed a keg of beer (all Budweiser to standardize the prices) for the working Rotarians. A special beer chiller/dispenser was set up in the cooking building to control "freebees." This seemed to work well. The beer was sold in one size only (14 oz.) in plastic cups donated by Budweiser. The ice for beer, soft drinks, iced tea, and wine coolers was also donated by Budweiser.

ACTIVITY. The Budweiser team arrived at the park around 10 a.m. Saturday and set up the beer booth and beer chiller. The team consisted of Mr. Brad Wolfe, Mr. Bill Falkenhagen, and Mr. Brett Brannen. The team remained all day, insuring a continuous supply of cold beer. At approximately 8:00 p.m. the team closed the booth, removed all equipment and left the facility in a nice, clean condition. Rotarians and volunteers had only to sell the beer.

RESULTS. A total of 25 kegs (140 cups/keg) of beer were sold (20 kegs to the public and 5 to the Rotarians).

SECTION 2 - SOFT DRINKS

CHAIRMAN: WALT WICKER

PROCUREMENT. The soft drink concession was provided by Coca Cola of Galveston, Mr. Ron Berry, telephone number, Office - 488-8987, Home - 938-8627. Coca Cola was awarded the concession without competition. The prices were \$10 per tank with a minimum of 5 tanks. Each tank provided approximately 100 12 oz. drinks with ice and sold for 50¢ each. The cups were also purchased. As stated earlier, Budweiser donated most of the ice. Three trailers were requested to dispense 15 Coke, 7 Tab, and 7 Sprite containers.

ACTIVITY. On Friday afternoon I met the Coca Cola trailer team to park the trailer overnight in a reasonably secure parking area (lighter area in front of the park manager's house). One trailer was delivered. Extensive conversation with the Coke representative after delivery did not change the situation.

On Saturday the trailer was moved into position in the eating area and set up by extensive effort by Rotarians and volunteers. The single trailer was totally inadequate, but by a super effort by Walt Wicker, the single trailer made do.

Problems were encountered with leaking tank valves. Walt did a complete clean-up of the Coke stand Saturday evening and the trailer was moved to the storage area by Rotarians. The Coca Cola Company only delivered the trailer Friday evening and picked it up the following Monday; "Nothing Else."

RESULTS. All Coke, Sprite and Tab was sold by late afternoon (except one Tab, valve failure). In addition, Chuck Jacobson made two trips to a League City supermarket to purchase approximately \$130 of additional soft drinks.

SECTION 3 - WINE COOLERS

CHAIRMAN: AL JOWID

PROCUREMENT. Schlitz did not bid on the beer concession, but proposed to provide a wine cooler supplies and services. Following approval of the Shrimporee chairman for a new beverage this year, Schlitz, Mr. Hal Gregory was given the go-ahead. Ten casts of wine (18 liter/cast), 6 white (Chablis) and 4 pink (Rose'), were delivered Saturday morning at the cost of \$23.95 per cast. A wine cooler consists of 1/2 part wine and 1/2 part soda (Chablis/club soda - Rose'/sweet soda) over ice. Each cast will supply approximately 100 - 12 oz. drinks, sold at \$1 each. Rotary Ann's were the primary volunteers for the wine coolers.

RESULTS. Almost four casts were sold at the Shrimporee (more advertisement - sign needed) and four casts were sold to Rotarians the following Monday. Two casts were returned to Schlitz. The club soda and Sprite were purchased from a super market for the introduction of the wine cooler. This worked okay, but could possibly be improved for larger sales volume.

SECTION 4 - OTHER DATA

LICENSE - The liquor license was obtained and donated by Larry Rowe. Note: Locating the wine cooler booth on one end of the beer concession required only a single liquor license for both.

\$ CURRENCY - The change projected for each of the three concessions was estimated and provided by the Shrimporee Treasurer Saturday and worked out well. The change aprons (nail pouches) were provided by Alan Wylie. These are being laundered and placed in the Rotary store house.

SPECIAL ITEM - Both Carlos Villagomez and Al Jowid delivered beer and wine coolers to the Auction crowd. This was a great idea because the drinks sold immediately (no one wanted to leave the auction to get a drink). Better trays and more members on the beverage committee to serve drinks is recommended.

FINANCIAL RESULTS - The expenses and income from the Beverage Committee is reported in the treasurer's report.

Below are answers to your seven questions.

- a. We sold ice tea for fifty cents a glass plus all the refills they wanted. We sold around \$150. worth of iced tea. We also marked down the cut desserts at 5:00 o'clock, but not the whole cakes, pies, etc. until the last minute.
- b. Put a rope at each end of our booth to keep people out, plus we don't need an extra table at the end of the booth. The desserts should be set on the busy side of the dessert booth to avoid the sun melting the frostings, etc.
- c. I started off by dividing the overall list into groups of 6 names per group and chopse 19 people I knew to do the calling of six people, what they would bake and if they could help in the booth and what time. (Marge Jacobson is working on a revised list of womens names.) The women called anywhere from 2 3 weeks ahead of time. From these lists I compiled the major list knowing who was bringing what and what time they would be helping in the booth. Next year I would recommend only having 6 women working in the booth per hour to avoid the crowding of each other, but to have a few people handy in case we need more people at the last minute.

I talked with Alan Wylie (Logistics) to see what we had stored and what would have to be ordered, he bought what we needed.

The article for the August Blastoff had to be run off at Kwik Kopy (charged to the Shrimporee, dessert committee), then taken to Walt Wickers office at U of HCLC.

In checking with Aaron Schein (treasurer) I asked for \$200. worth of change to start off with. I would recommend only \$100., fifty ones, and fifty in quarters.

d. We sold iced tea for 50¢ a glass, coffee 25¢ a cup, whole cakes and pies from \$4. to \$7. each. Cut desserts from 25¢ to 50¢ea.

- e. The only expenses I had was the Kwik Kopy bill for running off the article for the Blastoff in August. Other than that Alan Wylie bought coffee, tea, and cups for tea. Incidentally the bill from Kwik Kopy was \$12.20.
- f. I don*t have anyone to list here.
- I started about nine o'clock and had two helpers by 10:00. The boy scouts set up two tables inside our booth and one at the end for dropping off desserts. We covered the serving area with green cloths furnished by Bill Twite, and plastic cloths on the two center tables where the desserts are cut. Two signs were made one for inside the other for outside the booth for all to see the prices of everything sold. Later a third sign was made stating that iced tea was 50¢ a glass with refills and that sign did the trick as we sold a lot of ice tea after that. We set out our knives, spatulas, etc for cutting cakes & pies and had a large jar of water for cleaning utinsils. We found at least 2 cloths handy for clean up. We made coffee right away for the Shrimporee helpers. The tea was made in an Ingloo plus ice was kept in another Igloo. l large bag of ice and 4 small bags. We were ready to take any desserts that were dropped off from 9:00 on, plus take the persons name and what they brought. We had 61 people to donate desserts this year.

Just before closing we makked the remaining items very reasonable. We had several left and gave to the boy scouts who had been helping with set up and clean up duty. The items to be returned to storage were boxed up and placed in a designated area for Alan Wylie. The money was turned over to Aaron Schein. June Rosenhagen has the Mr. Coffee and 7 money aprons at her house ready for next year. Also an opened coffee, creamer and instant tea.

Jack I hope I have given the information you were wanting. If there is anything else which I left out please let me know.

I enjoyed working with the women in this project. It's a great way to meet the women and hope to get to know them better. Thank you for asking me to be the chairman, I thoroughly enjoyed it.

The method of food serving, for the 1982 Shrimporee was changed from serving windows to buffet style self service. This change in the method of food serving seemed to work very well, however, it did require some changes in planning and action. See attached layout.

- There is not adequate space for self service lines inside the cook shed, so it was decided to set up table outside at the north end of the shed.
- A canopy frame was built and covered on top with heavy gauge plastic. Size of the canopy frame was approximately 20' wide X 30' long and 10 ft. high.
- Beneath the canopy, 4 tables, each $3'\ X\ 8'$ were set up with one serving line per table planned. However, 2 lines per table could be used in the event of a large turnout.
- Inside the cook shack only 2 serving windows were used with 3' X 8' table (corner) for storage of supplies and a 3' X 8' table (between windows) to hold food trays.
- Food serving, as in past years was divided into 3 2 hour shifts. chairman and 2 co-chairmen were each responsible for 1 shift. Each shift consisted of a chairman and 12 people as indicated on attached schedule.
- Clean-up crew is not a part of food serving committee as in the past. However, 4 people should be assigned to dismantle the canopy frame and prepare it for storage.

SUMMARY OF 1982

- * Total meals served 2514 (ticket count) child 337 adult 2177
- * Self service went very smoothly.
- * No refill policy presented no major problems. Few complaints and a few filled plates to overflowing, but these incidents were minimal.
- * Approximately 42 Rotarians and volunteers worked on Food Serving Committee. This is less than 50% of needs in past years.
- * Two hour shifts did not seem to present any problems.
- * In addition to scheduled servers, 2 Boy Scouts were assigned to end of serving line to clean up any spilled plates or trays.
- * Disposable aluminum serving trays work well.
- Disposable styrofoam ice chests were used as serving trays for shrimp.

SUGGESTIONS FOR 1983

- * Continue self service lines
- * Use disposable serving trays
- * Design canopy frame to use lumber with maximum length of 8' for easier assembly, dismanteling and storage.
- * Assign one additional person to work in shrimp boil area to fill serving containers with shrimp.
- * Assign one additional person to work inside cook shack at the serving windows to pass trays to food monitors outside.
- * Use only 101 plates.
- * 1982 layouts and schedules attached.

TO REMAIN IN THE AREA OF THE SERVING TABLES AND REPLACE THE VARIOUS FOOD TRAYS AS THEY BECOME EMPTY.

AS THE SUPPLY BECOMES LOW, THE MONITOR SHOULD CALL FOR A FULL TRAY OF THE ITEM NEEDED.

THE FULL TRAY MAY BE PICKED UP AT THE SERVING WINDOWS OF THE COOK SHACK ADJACENT TO THE SERVING TABLES.

COOK SHACK RUNNERS

TO REMAIN IN THE COOK SHACK AND ASSURE THAT FULL TRAYS OF EACH FOOD ITEM IS AVAILABLE, AT ALL TIMES, TO BE PASSED THROUGH THE SERVING WINDOWS AT THE NORTH END OF THE BUILDING TO THE FOOD MONITORS.

ALSO RETURN EMPTY TRAYS TO THE VARIOUS AREAS WHERE FOOD IS BEING PREPARED.



Fish Frying and Fish Fryers

Going " A - la Carte" instead of "food service" need not preclude some fish frying. We could sell fish "by-the-serving" provided:

- a) We cook small amounts (less quantity)
- b) at the rate of consumption (with no backlog)

If a fryer or two fail on us, it's no big deal. If we get behind (production less than consumption), it doesn't stop the show - come back in a few minutes and we'll have a hot batch. If we run out of fish at 4:00 pm, it's not a calamity. No ticket refunds required.

Even if we stay in the fish frying business - at a reduced level - I recommend we uncouple our ties with the Brazosport Rotary. We give to them their fryers and we keep ours. The fryers are old, worn out, and undependable. Every year HL & P (Jim Wyatt) repairs them, we store tham all year and Brazosport borrows them for 2 weeks. To my knowledge, they contribute nothing to the partnership. When we get them back we never know if they are working or not.

. . I have suggested to Chuck Jacobson that he arrange a meeting with representatives of the Brazosport Rotary and we negotiate an equitable divorce hopefully without malice or rancor.
