Convention in He said: "Only time will tell whether this change that Munich. has been forced on us by the Court will be for better or worse. It may yet prove to be the best thing that happened, if only because we will be able to shed the offensive "sexist" label which has hampered Rotary growth in many places; the lobby groups will now probably leave us alone and turn to other targets, unless we foolishly try to circumvent the law; we will no longer have to debate whether or not to accept women members; and we should now be able to devote our time and energies to what we should be about in the first place -- serving others and bringing hope to those who need our help. Unquote.
